

Luther Ronzoni Vandross (April 20, 1951 – July 1, 2005) was an American singer-songwriter and record producer. During his career, Vandross sold over twenty-five million albums and won eight Grammy Awards including Best Male R&B Vocal Performance four times. He won four Grammy Awards in 2004 including the Grammy Award for Song of the Year for the track "Dance with My Father", co-written with Richard Marx.

Biography

1951-1979: Early life and career

Luther Ronzoni Vandross was born on April 20, 1951 at Bellevue Hospital in Manhattan, New York City, United States. He was the fourth child and second son of Mary Ida Vandross and Luther Vandross, Sr.

Vandross was raised on Manhattan's Lower East Side in the NYCHA Alfred E. Smith Houses public housing development and began playing the piano at age three. He grew up in a musical family that moved to the Bronx when he was thirteen. His sister, Patricia Vandross, sang with the vocal group The Crests, who had a number two hit in 1958/59 with "16 Candles", although she left the group before the song was recorded. [citation needed]

Vandross' father died of diabetes when Vandross was eight years old. In high school, Vandross performed in a group, Shades of Jade, that once played at the Apollo Theater in Harlem. He was also a member of a theater workshop, "Listen My Brother", which released the singles "Only Love Can Make a Better World" and "Listen My Brother". He also appeared in the second and fifth episodes of *Sesame Street* in November 1969. [citation needed]

Vandross attended Western Michigan University for a year before dropping out to continue pursuing a career in music. [citation needed]

His next hit credit was on an album by Roberta Flack in 1972. Wikipedia: Avoid weasel words [citation needed]

Vandross founded the first-ever Patti LaBelle fan club. [citation needed] Wikipedia: Manual of Style/Dates and numbers #Chronological items

Luther also sang on Delores Hall's *Hall-Mark* album (1973). He sang with her on the song "Who's Gonna Make It Easier for Me", which he wrote, and he contributed another song, "In This Lonely Hour". [citation needed] Having co-written "Fascination" (1974) for David Bowie's *Young Americans* (1975), he went on to tour with him as a back-up vocalist in September 1974. [citation needed] Vandross wrote "Everybody Rejoice" for the 1975 Broadway musical *The Wiz* and appeared as a choir member in the movie. [citation needed]

Vandross also sang backing vocals for artists including Roberta Flack, Chaka Khan, Bette Midler, Diana Ross, Carly Simon, Barbra Streisand, and Donna Summer, and for the bands Chic and Todd Rundgren's Utopia. [citation needed]

Before his breakthrough, Vandross was part of a singing quintet in the late '70s named Luther, consisting of former Shades of Jade members Anthony Hinton and Diane Sumler, as well as Theresa V. Reed, and Christine Wiltshire, signed to Cotillion Records. Although the singles "It's Good for the Soul", "Funky Music (Is a Part of Me)", and "The Second Time Around" were relatively successful, their two albums, the self-titled *Luther* (1976) and *This Close to You* (1977), didn't sell enough to make the charts. Vandross bought back the rights to those albums after Cotillion dropped the group, preventing their later re-release. [citation needed]

Vandross also wrote and sang commercial jingles during the late 1970s and early 1980s, and continued his successful career as a popular session singer during the late 1970s. [citation needed]

In 1978, Vandross sang lead vocals for a disco band called Greg Diamond's Bionic Boogie on the song titled "Hot Butterfly". [citation needed] Also in 1978, he appeared on Quincy Jones's Sounds...and Stuff Like That!!, most notably on the song "I'm Gonna Miss You In The Morning" along with Patti Austin. Luther also sang with the band Soirée and was the lead vocalist on the track "You Are the Sunshine of My Life"; he also contributed background vocals to the album along with Jocelyn Brown and Sharon Redd, each of whom also saw solo success. Additionally, he sang the lead vocals on the group Mascara LP title song "See You in L.A." released in 1979. Vandross also appeared on the group Charme's 1979 album Let It In, most notably on a remake of Toto's hit single "Georgy Porgy". [citation needed]

1980-2003: Career success

Vandross finally made his long desired career breakthrough as a featured singer with the vaunted pop-dance act Change, a studio concept created by French-Italian businessman Jacques Fred Petrus. Their 1980 hits, "The Glow of Love" (by Romani, Malavasi and Garfield) and "Searching" (by Malavasi), both featuring Vandross as lead singer, opened up the world for Vandross. And there was no doubt about whether Vandross liked the song "The Glow of Love". In an interview that Vibe Magazine did with him in 2001 Vandross said, "This is the most beautiful song I've ever sung in my life." Both songs were from Change's debut album The Glow of Love.

Vandross was also originally intended to perform on their second and highly successful album *Miracles* in 1981, but declined the offer as Petrus didn't pay enough money. Vandross' decision rapidly led to a recording contract with Epic Records that same year but didn't stop him from doing some background vocals on "Miracles" and on the new Petrus-created act, the B. B. & Q. Band in 1981. During that hectic year Vandross jump-started his second attempt at a solo career with his debut album, *Never Too Much*. In addition to the hit title track it contained a version of the Burt Bacharach / Hal David song "A House Is Not a Home".

The song "Never Too Much", written by himself, reached number-one on the R&B charts. This period also marked the beginning of frequent songwriting collaboration with bassist Marcus Miller, who played on many of the tracks and would also produce or co-produce a number of tracks for Vandross. The *Never Too Much* album was arranged by high school classmate Nat Adderley, Jr., a collaboration that would last through Vandross's career. [2]

Vandross released a series of successful R&B albums during the 1980s and continued his session work with guest vocals on groups like Charme in 1982. Many of his earlier albums made a bigger impact on the R&B charts than on the pop charts. During the 1980s, Vandross had two singles that reached #1 on the Billboard R&B charts: "Stop to Love", in 1986, and a duet with Gregory Hines—"There's Nothing Better Than Love." Vandross was at the helm as producer for Aretha Franklin's Gold-certified, award-winning comeback album *Jump to It*. He also produced the disappointing follow-up album, 1983's *Get It Right*.

In 1983, the opportunity to work with his main music influence, Dionne Warwick, came about with Vandross producing, writing songs, and singing on *How Many Times Can We Say Goodbye*, her fourth album for Arista Records. The title track duet reached #27 on the Hot 100 chart (#7 R&B/#4 Adult Contemporary), [4] while the second single, "Got a Date" was only a moderate hit (#45 R&B/#15 Club Play).

Vandross wrote "It's Hard for Me to Say" for Diana Ross from her Red Hot Rhythm & Blues album. Diana Ross performed the song as an a cappella tribute to Oprah Winfrey on her final season of The Oprah Winfrey Show. She then proceeded to add it to her successful 2010-12 "More Today Than Yesterday: The Greatest Hits Tour for the first time since its 1987. He also recorded a version of this song on his Your Secret Love album in 1996. He made two public appearances at Diana Ross's Return to Love Tour stop at its opening in Philadelphia at First Union Spectrum and its final stop at Madison Square Garden in 2000. [citation needed]

In 1985, Vandross first spotted the talent of Jimmy Salvemini, 15 at the time, on *Star Search*. He thought Salvemini had the perfect voice for some of his songs. He contacted Salvemini, who was managed by his brother Larry. A contract was negotiated with Elektra records for \$250,000 and Vandross agreed to produce the album. He even contacted old friends to appear on the album, Cheryl Lynn, Alfa Anderson (Chic), Phoebe Snow and Irene Cara.

After the album was completed, Vandross, Jimmy, and Larry decided to celebrate. On January 12, 1986, they were riding in Vandross' convertible Mercedes when it crossed the yellow lines of the two lane street and smashed into two vehicles. All three men were rushed to the hospital. Larry Salvemini died during surgery, and Vandross and Jimmy Salvemini survived. At first, the Salvemini family was supportive of Vandross. In 1986, Vandross faced vehicular manslaughter charges as a result of Larry's death. Vandross pled no contest to reckless driving. The Salvemini family filed a wrongful death suit against Vandross. The case was quietly settled out of court with a payment to the Salvemini family for \$700,000. [citation needed] The album called "Roll With It" was released later that year.

Vandross also sang background vocals in Stevie Wonder's 1985 hit "Part Time Lovers". [citation needed]

In 1986, Vandross voiced a cartoon character named Zack for three Saturday morning animated PSA spots for ABC Television called 'Zack of All Trades'. [citation needed]

The 1989 compilation *The Best of Luther Vandross... The Best of Love* included the ballad "Here and Now", his first single to chart in the Billboard pop chart top ten, peaking at number six. He won his first Grammy award for Best Male R&B Vocal Performance in 1991.

In 1990, Vandross wrote and sang background for Whitney Houston in a song entitled "Who Do You Love?" which appeared on her "I'm Your Baby Tonight" album. [citation needed]

More albums followed in the 1990s, beginning with 1991's *Power of Love* which spawned two top ten pop hits. He won his second Best Male R&B Vocal in the Grammy Awards of 1992 with the track "Power of Love/Love Power" winning the Grammy Award for Best R&B Song in the same year. In 1992, "The Best Things in Life Are Free", a duet with Janet Jackson from the movie *Mo' Money* became a hit.

In 1993, Vandross had a brief non-speaking role in the Robert Townsend movie *The Meteor Man*. He played a hit man who plotted to stop Townsend's title character. [citation needed]

Vandross hit the top ten again in 1994, teaming with Mariah Carey on a cover version of Lionel Richie and Diana Ross's duet "Endless Love". It was included on the album Songs (Luther Vandross album), a collection of songs which had inspired Vandross over the years. He also appears on Frank Sinatra's posthumous *Duets* album. At the Grammy Awards of 1997, he won his third Best Male R&B Vocal for the track "Your Secret Love".

A second greatest hits album, released in 1997, compiled most of his 1990s hits and was his final album released through Epic Records. After releasing *I Know* on Virgin Records, he signed with J Records. His first album on Clive Davis's new label, entitled *Luther Vandross*, was released in 2001, and it produced the hits "Take You Out" (#7 R&B/#26 Pop), and "I'd Rather" (#17 Adult Contemporary/#40 R&B/#83 Pop) Vandross scored at least one top 10 R&B hit every year from 1981-1994.

In 1997, Vandross sang the American national anthem during Super Bowl XXXI at the Louisiana Superdome, New Orleans, Louisiana.

In September 2001, Vandross performed a rendition of Michael Jackson's hit song "Man in the Mirror" at Jackson's 30th Anniversary special, alongside Usher.

In 2002, he gave some of his final concerts during his last tour, The BK Got Soul Tour starring Vandross featuring Angie Stone and Gerald Levert. [citation needed]

In the spring of 2003, Vandross' last collaboration was Doc Powell's "What's Going On" which was the cover of Marvin Gaye from Powell's 2003 album 97th and Columbus.

In 2003, Vandross released the album *Dance with My Father*. The title track, which was dedicated to Vandross' memory childhood dances with his father, won Vandross and his co-writer, Richard Marx, the 2004 Grammy Award for *Song of the Year*. The song also won Vandross his fourth and final award in the Best Male R&B Vocal Performance category. The album was his first to reach number one on the Billboard album chart. The video for the title track features various celebrities alongside their fathers and other family members. The 2nd single released from that album, "Think About You" was the Number One Urban Adult Contemporary Song of 2004 according to Radio & Records.

In 2003, after the televised NCAA Men's Basketball championship, CBS Sports gave "One Shining Moment" a new look. Vandross, who had been to only one basketball game in his life, was the new singer, and the video didn't have any special effects like glowing basketballs and star trails like it did in previous years. This song version is in use today.

2003-2005: Illness and death

Vandross suffered from diabetes and hypertension, both of which may have been brought on by family genetics as well as lifestyle nutrition. He had just finished the final vocals for the album *Dance With My Father* (2003), on which he collaborated with pop rock artist Richard Marx, whom he met in 1989.

On April 16, 2003, Vandross suffered a severe stroke at his home in New York City. The stroke left him in a coma for nearly two months, during which time he also had to fight both meningitis and pneumonia (which required a tracheotomy). The stroke also left Vandross with noticeable difficulty speaking and singing, as well as confinement to a wheelchair.

Vandross appeared briefly on videotape at the 2004 Grammy Awards to accept his Song of the Year Award for "Dance With My Father". In addition to thanking his fans for their support throughout his ordeal and recovery, he said, "When I say goodbye it's never for long, because I believe in the power of love" (he sang the last six words). Following an appearance on *The Oprah Winfrey Show*, he was never seen in public again.

Vandross died on July 1, 2005 at John F. Kennedy Medical Center in Edison, New Jersey at the age of 54. His apparent cause of death was a heart attack.

After two days of viewing at the Frank E. Campbell Funeral Chapel, his funeral was held at Riverside Church in New York City on July 8, 2005. Vandross is interred at George Washington Memorial Park in Paramus, New Jersey. Much of Vandross' estate was left to friends and his godson Mark West. [citation needed] Vandross never married, had no children, and his three older siblings died before him. He was survived by his mother, Mary Ida, who died in 2008.

Voice recognition

In 2008, Vandross was ranked #54 on Rolling Stone magazine's List of 100 Greatest Singers of All Time.

By popular vote, Luther Vandross was inducted into The SoulMusic Hall of Fame at SoulMusic.com in December 2012.

Tribute

In 1999, Whitney Houston sang Vandross' "So Amazing" as a tribute to Vandross as he sat in the audience during the Soul Train Awards. Johnny Gill, El Debarge, and Kenny Lattimore provided background vocals. On July 27, 2004, GRP Records released a smooth jazz various artists tribute album, *Forever, For Always, For Luther*, with ten popular songs written by Vandross. The album featured vocal arrangements by Luther, and was produced by Rex Rideout and Bud Harner. Rideout had co-authored songs and contributed arrangements and played keyboards on Vandross's final three albums. The tribute album was mixed by Ray Bardani, who recorded and mixed most of Luther's music over the years. It featured an ensemble of smooth jazz performers, many of whom had previously worked with Vandross. [5]

On September 20, 2005, the album *So Amazing: An All-Star Tribute to Luther Vandross* was released. The album is a collection of some of his songs performed by various artists, including Stevie Wonder, Mary J. Blige, Usher, Fantasia, Beyoncé Knowles, Donna Summer, Alicia Keys, Elton John, Celine Dion, Wyclef Jean, Babyface, Patti LaBelle, John Legend, Angie Stone, Jamie Foxx, Teddy Pendergrass, and Aretha Franklin. Aretha Franklin won a Grammy for her rendition of "A House Is Not a Home", and Stevie Wonder and Beyoncé won a Grammy for their cover of "So Amazing".

The violin duo Nuttin' But Stringz did a remix of the song "Dance with My Father" for their album *Struggle from the Subway to the Charts*, which was released on October 3, 2006. On November 21, 2006, saxophonist Dave Koz released a followup to the earlier smooth jazz GRP tribute album, this time on his own Rendezvous Entertainment label, an album called *Forever, For Always, For Luther Volume II*, also produced by Rex Rideout and Bud Harner. Dave Koz played on all the featured Luther Vandross tracks, which were recorded by various smooth jazz artists. ^[6]

In 2007, Deniece Williams included "Never Too Much" on her *Love, Niecy Style* CD. Williams said that she recorded the song to say "I love you" to her old friend. The music video "Bye Bye" from Mariah Carey sees Vandross' picture appear in the closing images. His image was included as a tribute along with various other deceased people with whom Carey had collaborated. [citation needed]

On *A Different Me*, Keyshia Cole sings the outro to "Luther Vandross" on "Playa Cardz Right", which features rapper Tupac Shakur. Guitarist Norman Brown did a rendition of "Any Love" on his 1994 album *After The Storm*. R&B band 112 sampled Vandross' "Don't You Know That" to make their song "Love Me" on their second album *Room 112*. Saxophonist Boney James covers his rendition on his final track "The Night I Fell In Love" on *Backbone* in 1994. [citation needed]

In 2009, Jadakiss sampled Vandross' "Promise Me" to make his song "The Things I've Been Through" on his album, "The Last Kiss". [citation needed]

In 2010, NPR ^[7] included Vandross in its 50 Greatest Voices in recorded history, saying Vandross represents "the platinum standard for R&B song stylings." The announcement was made on NPR's *All Things Considered* on November 29, 2010 ^[8] [citation needed]

Jacob Lusk performed "Dance With My Father" on *American Idol* season 10 as a tribute to his late father Gregory Lusk and as a tribute to Vandross on April 20, 2011. [citation needed]

Author Craig Seymour wrote a book about Vandross called *Luther: The Life and Longing of Luther Vandross*. The book includes numerous interviews with Vandross.

On December 31, 2012, America Stand-up comedian/actor and television host Eric Andre referenced Luther Vandross on his television show "The Eric Andre Show" in an episode called "New Year's Eve Spooktacular! [9]". The segment was called "The Luther Vandross Wheel" which was dedicated to his memory.

New releases

J Records released a song, "Shine"—an upbeat R&B track that samples Chic's disco song "My Forbidden Lover"—which reached #31 on the R&B chart. [citation needed] The song was originally slated to be released on the soundtrack to the movie, The Fighting Temptations, but it was shelved. This is evidenced by a reference to "fighting temptation" in two of the verses. [citation needed] A later remix of the song peaked at #10 on the Club Play chart. [citation needed] "Shine" and a track titled "Got You Home" were previously unreleased songs on The Ultimate Luther Vandross (2006), a greatest hits album on Epic Records/J Records/Legacy Recordings that was released August 22, 2006. [citation needed]

On October 16, 2007, Epic Records/J Records/Legacy Recordings released a 4-disc boxset titled *Love*, *Luther*. It features nearly all of Vandross' R&B and pop hits throughout his career, as well as unreleased live tracks, alternate versions, and outtakes from sessions that Vandross recorded. The set also includes "There's Only You," a version of which had originally appeared on the soundtrack to the 1987 film *Made in Heaven*.^[10]

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



Never Too Much is the debut solo album by American R&B/soul singer Luther Vandross, released in 1981 (see 1981 in music). It peaked at number nineteen on the *Billboard* 200 (then known as Pop Albums), peaked at #1 on the R&B Albums chart, and went double platinum by the RIAA. The album earned Vandross two Grammy Award nominations in 1982—"Best New Artist" and "Best R&B Vocal Performance, Male".

The album's title track topped the Black Singles chart for two weeks. Also, his rendition of Dionne Warwick's 1964 "A House Is Not a Home" became one his signature songs, while it received attention for its transformation into an "epic" since its duration was extended to seven minutes.

Forever, For Always, For Love is the second studio album by American R&B/soul singer Luther Vandross, released in September 1982. It peaked in the top 20 on the Billboard 200 and was his second album to top the Top R&B/Hip-Hop Albums chart where it spent three weeks.

The album was certified platinum by the RIAA, and earned Vandross a Grammy Award nomination for *Best R&B Vocal Performance, Male*, but lost to Marvin Gaye for his song *Sexual Healing*.

The hit "Since I Lost My Baby" was originally recorded by The Temptations in 1965, while the "Having a Party" part of the opening track was originally recorded by Sam Cooke in 1962. The album's opening track was heard

during the opening credits of the 1990 film *House Party. Rolling Stone* gave the album a four-star rating, describing Vandross as "the most gifted male pop-soul singer of his generation".

In 2004, singer Lalah Hathaway covered the song "Forever, for Always, for Love" for the compilation album *Forever, for Always, for Luther*. She later included the song on her third album *Outrun the Sky*





Dance with My Father is the thirteenth and final studio album by American R&B-soul singer-songwriter Luther Vandross. It was released in the United States on June 10, 2003 by J Records, The album, especially its title track, was dedicated to Vandross' late father.

The title track single was a hit on Pop, R&B, and Adult Contemporary radio. It received the 2004 Grammy Award for Song of the Year, which Luther shared with his father.

The Glow of Love received positive reviews from the majority of critics. Alex Henderson writing retrospectively for Allmusic awarded the album 4.5 stars describing it as a disco/R&B masterpiece and Change's most essential album. Nile Rodgers and Bernard Edwards' Chic sound is noted as a heavy influence but Henderson argues that knowledgeable disco and R&B enthusiasts knew better; Change wasn't a carbon copy of Chic any more than jazz great Chet Baker was a clone of Miles Davis. "A Lover's Holiday" is marked as a playful opener, while "It's a Girl's Affair" and "Angel in my Pocket" are highlighted as sassy and passionate.

Robert Christgau writing at the time, summarises the album as New and true and gay, and having the complete bag of [Disco/R&B] tricks. The influence of Chic is again noted in "A Lover's Holiday" which he describes as a Rodgers-&-Edwards rip. Christgau compares "The End" to the electronic music of good ole Giorgio Moroder.

The album's showcasing of Luther Vandross is highlighted in most reviews. Ed Hogan writing for Allmusic describes the "The Glow of Love" as a startling introduction to Vandross' dazzling singing style. Henderson remarks that the laid-back title song which Vandross sang on became a quiet storm favorite and demonstrates that not everything Change recorded was aimed at the dancefloor. Vandross had yet to secure a solo career in 1980, although many of the people who heard his performances on those two gems agreed that a solo career was inevitable.

Several songs from the album received airplay on jazz and R&B stations, but Hathaway's cover of "Forever, For Always, For Love" was the biggest success, becoming a #1 Adult R&B hit, reaching the Top 40 on the main R&B chart, and even approaching the Hot 100 (it "bubbled under" at #112).

On November 21, 2006, saxophonist Dave Koz released a followup to the earlier GRP tribute album, this time a Luther tribute album by various artists on his own Rendezvous Entertainment label, called *Forever, For Always, For Luther Volume II*, also produced by Rex Rideout and Bud Harner. Dave Koz played on all the follow-up album's tracks, which were recorded by smooth jazz artists Patti Austin, Gerald Albright, Jonathan Butler, Norman Brown, Will Downing, Everette Harp, Jeff Lorber, Maysa, Najee, Wayman Tisdale, Kevin Whalum and Kirk Whalum. ^[2]

"Never Too Much" is a song performed by Luther Vandross. The song was released in 1981, as the title track of the album of the same name. The title track hit number one on the soul singles chart and peaked at number thirty-three on the *Billboard* Hot 100.

The album (Vandross's first as a solo artist) was popular, although it failed to sell in large numbers initially. Sales were boosted by his other chart successes and, eventually, by his death. [citation needed] A remixed version of the song reached No.13 on the UK singles chart in November 1989.

The single is also included on his later album *Luther Vandross - The Ultimate*, which was released in 2001. The single was released alongside a music video in which he is shown singing in a recording studio.

The song was used in the soundtrack for the Rockstar Games title, *Grand Theft Auto: Vice City* on the in-game radio station Emotion 98.3.

The first minute of this song is used in the WKRP In Cincinnati episode "Fire" from season four, until it is unceremoniously cut off by Les Nessman when he reports that the Flimm Building is on fire.

Cover versions

In 1996, guitarist Craig T. Cooper covered the song for his album *Romantic Letter*. In 1997, contemporary jazz guitarist Richard Smith recorded a take on the album *First Kiss*. In 2004, jazz guitarist Paul Jackson, Jr. recorded a cover for the Vandross tribute album, *Forever, For Always, For Luther*. In 2005, it was covered by Mary J. Blige for another Vandross tribute album entitled *So Amazing: An All-Star Tribute to Luther Vandross*. In 2013, vocalist Tracy Hamlin covered the song for her album *This Is My Life*

"If This World Were Mine" is a 1967 song by soul music duo Marvin Gaye and Tammi Terrell from their album *United*. Written solely by Gaye, it was one of the few songs they recorded without Ashford & Simpson writing or producing. When it was released as a single in November 1967 as the B-side to the duo's "If I Could Build My Whole World Around You", it hit the *Billboard* pop singles chart, peaking at number sixty-eight, and peaked at number twenty-seven on the *Billboard* R&B singles chart. Gaye would later put the song into his set list during his last tours in the early-1980s as he performed a medley of his hits with Terrell.

The song is covered by Joe Bataan on the 1968 Fania Allstars LP *Live at the Red Garter, Vol.* 2, and by Ambrose Slade (pre-Slade) on their 1969 album *Beginnings*.

Fifteen years after the original recording, Luther Vandross and Cheryl Lynn re-recorded it for her album *Instant Love* and made the song a R&B top five smash peaking at number four in 1982. A decade later, Coko of SWV and rising R&B singer and Tyrese recorded it for her 1999 solo album *Hot Coko*. In 2005, Alicia Keys and Jermaine Paul recorded it for the Luther Vandross tribute album *So Amazing: An All-Star Tribute to Luther Vandross*. R&B singer Tweet sampled the Gaye/Terrell original for the intro of her 2005 single "Turn Da Lights Off", featuring Missy Elliott.

The song is featured on John Legend's 2004 live album *Solo Sessions Vol. 1: Live at the Knitting Factory*, with Imani Uzuri singing the female lead.

The cover version by R&B/Soul artists Alicia Keys and Jermaine Paul was nominated Best R&B Performance by a Duo or Group with Vocals at the Grammy Awards. They didn't win. The Grammy was honored to Beyoncé Knowles and Stevie Wonder for "So Amazing."

"Since I Lost My Baby" is a 1965 hit single recorded by The Temptations for the Motown Records' Gordy label. Written by Miracles members Smokey Robinson and Pete Moore and produced by Robinson, the song was a top 20 pop single on the Billboard Hot 100 in the United States, on which it peaked at number 17. On *Billboard's* R&B singles chart, "Since I Lost My Baby" peaked at number four.

Longing and melancholy, "Since I Lost My Baby" tells a story about the pain of losing a lover. Temptations lead singer David Ruffin, as the song's narrator, describes an idyllic world where everyone has everything they could ask for, except he doesn't have his love:

The birds are singin' and the children are playin'

There's plenty of work and the bosses are payin'

Not a sad word should a young heart be sayin'

But fun is a bore, and with money I'm poor

Since I lost my baby...

Bass singer Melvin Franklin is also heard out front, singing "Oh, Yeah" after Ruffin's first two lines on the first verse (this is repeated by the group on the last verse).

The Action released their George Martin-produced version in 1966. Luther Vandross covered the song for his 1982 album *Forever, For Always, For Love*. In 2005, Angie Stone re-recorded it for the Vandross tribute album *So Amazing: An All-Star Tribute to Luther Vandross*. Also in 2005, Rhino released the only official recording of the band Legion of Mary, fronted by Jerry Garcia, containing an instrumental version from a May 22, 1975 concert. On Michael McDonald's 2003 album, Motown (the first of 2 albums of Motown cover songs), the song was covered as well.

"Superstar" is a 1969 song written by Bonnie Bramlett and Leon Russell (with a songwriting credit also given to Delaney Bramlett) that has been a hit for many artists in different genres and interpretations in the years since; the best known version is by the Carpenters in 1971.

Original Delaney and Bonnie version

Accounts of the song's origin vary somewhat, but it grew out of the late 1969/early 1970 nexus of English and American musicians known as Delaney & Bonnie and Friends, that involved Delaney and Bonnie Bramlett, Leon Russell, Eric Clapton, and various others. The song's working title during portions of its development was "**Groupie Song**".

In its first recorded incarnation, the song was called "**Groupie** (**Superstar**)", and was recorded and released as a B-side to the Delaney & Bonnie single "Comin' Home" in December 1969. Released by Atlantic Records, the full credit on the single was to Delaney & Bonnie and Friends Featuring Eric Clapton.

Sung by Bonnie, the arrangement featured slow guitar and bass parts building up to an almost gospel-style chorus using horns.

The song was about, as the title suggests, a groupie who holds a strong love for a rock star after a short sexual involvement. He has moved on to the next town, and despite his promises to see her again she can now only hear him on the radio. She is just left with the pure hopeless yearning of the chorus:

Don't you remember! You told me you loved me, baby

You said you'd be coming back this way again, baby

Baby, baby, baby, baby, oh, baby, I love you! I really do ...

Delaney & Bonnie were not yet well known at the time, and "Comin' Home" only reached number 84 on the U.S. pop singles chart, although it achieved a peak of sixteen on the UK Singles Chart.

Mad Dogs and Englishmen version

During the first half of 1970, Joe Cocker's legendary Mad Dogs and Englishmen Revue toured in the United States. Ex-Delaney and Bonnie vocalist Rita Coolidge was a backup singer on this tour, and song co-writer Leon Russell was the bandleader. Some accounts have Coolidge suggesting or inspiring the song's creation in the first place, and working with Bonnie Bramlett on her portion of the writing. In any case, Coolidge was given a featured vocal on the song during the tour; she took the verses with an air of resignation but the choruses with more anguish. The arrangement was fueled by Russell's evocative piano line laced with dynamic fills, with understated horns, guitar, and choir behind it.

In August 1970, the live album *Mad Dogs and Englishmen* was released, using performances of the song, using the name "**Superstar**", recorded in March and June of that year. The *Mad Dogs* album became a huge hit, reaching number 2 on the Billboard pop albums chart and number 23 on the Billboard Black Albums chart. The performance helped vault Coolidge to greater visibility, especially when it was also included in the 1971 film of the revue.

Bette Midler version

The unknown but very lively singer Bette Midler began making regular appearances on *The Tonight Show Starring Johnny Carson* in August 1970. During one such appearance, she sang "Superstar" in an understated arrangement that featured only a piano for accompaniment.

Later, once the Carpenters' version had become a hit, she sang it again on *The Tonight Show* in October 1971. Her recording of it then appeared on her 1972 debut album *The Divine Miss M*. Midler used the contrast between her personality and that of Karen Carpenter's, and a supposed but non-existent personal rivalry between them, as comic material for the next couple of years.

Other early versions

Around September 1970, Cher recorded "Superstar" as her last single for Atco Records. Released in October or November 1970, and in the gap between Sonny and Cher's heyday and the start of Cher's solo successes, it did not chart. After the song became better known, a concert performance of it was included in the 1973 *Sonny & Cher In Las Vegas, Volume 2*. Cher's version did apparently feature a lyric change that would become more famous in the Carpenters version.

Vikki Carr used the song as the title track of a 1971 album. The following year, Peggy Lee included the tune on her album *Norma Deloris Egstrom from Jamestown, North Dakota*, her final disc for Capitol Records. In Australia, Colleen Hewett's recording of "Superstar", which was released by May 1971 and became a moderate hit in Australia.

"Superstar" became its biggest hit version for the Carpenters. Richard Carpenter was unaware of the Bramlett or Mad Dogs originals, but as he later wrote in a compilation album's liner notes: "I came home from the studio one night and heard a then relatively unknown Bette Midler performing this song on the *Tonight Show*. I could barely wait to arrange and record it. (It remains one of my favorites)." Somewhat ironically, Karen Carpenter *had* heard the Coolidge rendition on a promotional copy of the *Mad Dogs* album, but did not think that much of it.

Richard's arrangement featured an oboe line at the start, followed by Karen's clear contralto voice set against a quiet bass line in the verses, which then built up to up-tempo choruses with a quasi-orchestral use of horns and strings. Produced by Richard with Jack Daugherty, it was recorded with members of the famed Los Angeles session musicians The Wrecking Crew. Karen Carpenter recorded her vocal in just one take (which in fact was the "work lead" normally used to guide the other musicians), using lyrics scribbled by Richard on a paper napkin. Since the song's subject was more risqué than usual for the clean-cut image of the Carpenters, Richard changed a lyric in the second verse from:

And I can hardly wait

To sleep with you again

To the somewhat less suggestive:

And I can hardly wait

To be with you again.

Whether he knew of the similar previous lyric change or did it independently is unclear. The song's publisher was delighted with Richard's lyric change, saying the previous wording had kept many other artists from recording it. (The timing of the Carpenters' first recording of the song is unclear; it is possible that Richard submitted the change to the publisher well in advance of their ultimate release of the recording, and that this influenced the other early versions.) In any case, upon hearing the final recording, Karen Carpenter finally recognized the power of the song.

The duo's rendition was included on the May 1971 album *Carpenters*, and then released as a single in September 1971. It rose to number 2 on the *Billboard* Hot 100 pop singles chart (held out of the top spot by Rod Stewart's "Maggie May") and spent two weeks at number one on the Easy Listening chart that autumn and earned gold record status. It also reached number 18 on the UK pop singles chart and did well in Australia and New Zealand as well.

Richard would be nominated for a Grammy Award for Best Arrangement Accompanying Vocalist for his efforts. "Superstar" would go on to appear on two mid-1970s Carpenters live albums as well as innumerable compilation albums. For instance, it appeared on the Carpenters' 2004 SACD compilation, *The Singles: 1969–1981* (not to be confused with the regular CD, *The Singles: 1969–1981*), as a remix of the original 1973 mix on the similarly titled compilation *The Singles: 1969–1973*.

Opinion is divided as to whether the Carpenters' treatment of the song lost the meaning of the original, or subversively kept that meaning under the cover of their image, or found a broader meaning that established the song as a standard for years to come, or some combination of all of these. At the time, Karen's vocal did receive some praise for its intensity and emotional nature. When asked how she could sing the song lacking any personal experience in the subject matter, Karen said in a 1972 interview, "I've seen enough groupies hanging around to sense their loneliness, even though they usually don't show it. I can't really understand them, but I just tried to feel empathy and I guess that's what came across in the song."

In 1981, Karen spoke of the song: "For some reason that tune didn't hit me in the beginning, it's the only one. Richard looked at me like I had three heads, he said: 'Are you out of your mind?' When I heard his arrangement of it, I fell over and now it's one of my favorites too."^[1] She added that "Superstar", along with "Rainy Days and Mondays" and "I Need to Be in Love", were the songs that were most emotionally upsetting to sing. Richard later remembered that "Solitaire" was another song that Karen did not like at first.^[2]

In the 1995 comedy film *Tommy Boy*, David Spade's character and Chris Farley's character argue over what music to listen to on the radio (Farley prefers heavy metal; Spade prefers more modern rock) when they stumble upon this song. Both insist that the other should turn to another station if the song offends them; in the next scene, both of them are loudly (and emotionally) singing the song's chorus. The song was also used in the 2007 movie, *Ghost Rider*, with Nicolas Cage as the Ghost Rider. In the movie, Donal Logue tries to turn off "Superstar", when Cage defends the song and states that nobody messes with Karen Carpenter. On the *Ghost Rider* official soundtrack, a song is entitled "A Thing for Karen Carpenter".

Back to Bonnie

The original Delaney and Bonnie version would finally surface on an album in 1972 when *D&B Together* was released, shortly before their marriage and collaboration ended. This version was also included as a bonus track on a 2006 reissue of the 1970 album *Eric Clapton*.

Bonnie Bramlett would later re-record the song on her 2002 solo album *I'm Still the Same*. Now using just the "Superstar" title, she did it as a very slow, piano-based torch song.

Luther Vandross version

In the early 1980s American R&B singer Luther Vandross had "Superstar" in his stage act, sometimes in a rendition that stretched out at nearly six minutes, with vocal interpolations, an interpretive dancer, and plenty of swaying and swooning females in the audience.

Vandross then recorded "Superstar" in 1983 in a slower, more soulful fashion, as part of a medley with Stevie Wonder's "Until You Come Back to Me (That's What I'm Gonna Do)" on his album *Busy Body*. Released as a single the following year, it became an R&B hit, reaching number 5 on the Billboard Top R&B Singles chart. It did not have much pop crossover effect, however, only reaching number 87 on the Billboard Hot 100.

This was the first prominent version by a male singer, and by now the original "groupie" association was far gone. Instead, the song was presented as a tale of universal longing.

Ruben Studdard version

Second-season *American Idol* contestant Ruben Studdard found his melismatic, R&B groove early in the Final 12 rounds when he performed a Vandross-influenced "Superstar". It got rave reviews from the judges and established Studdard as one of the early leaders in the competition, a position he held through his narrow May 2003 win over second-place finisher Clay Aiken.

By now his signature song, Studdard recorded "Superstar" as the B-side of his June 2003 first single and number two hit, "Flying Without Wings". Studdard would earn a 2004 Grammy Award nomination for Best Male R&B Vocal Performance for "Superstar", but lose out to his idol Vandross (who won for "Dance with My Father"). Studdard's treatment was also included on his December 2003 debut album *Soulful*.

Other later versions

In addition to those mentioned earlier, "Superstar" has been recorded by:

- American Spring (a group consisting of Brian Wilson's wife and sister-in-law) on their Spring album in 1972.
- Frances Yip, on her Portrait Of Frances Yip LP in 1973.
- Raquel Welch performed the song with John Belushi (as Joe Cocker) on the April 24, 1976 broadcast of Saturday Night Live.
- David Spinozza recorded the song for his 1978 album Spinozza. The arrangement featured Spinozza playing the
 melody on guitar, with background vocals by Luther Vandross, David Lasley, and Diva Gray.
- English singer Elkie Brooks, on her 1981 album Pearls.
- Keely Smith recorded this in 1985 for her LP, I'm In Love Again, on Fantasy Records.
- On the 1993 soundtrack of the movie Wayne's World 2, a band called Superfan is performing "Superstar".
 Superfan is a collective including Chrissie Hynde (from the Pretenders) on vocals and the musicians from Urge Overkill.
- Jazz saxophonist David Sanborn covered the song from his 1995 album *Pearls*.
- Philippine singer Regine Velasquez in her 1997 album *Retro*.
- Sonic Youth, who always found unlikely inspiration from the Carpenters, for the 1994 tribute album *If I Were a Carpenter*. This version was later on the soundtrack for the 2007 film *Juno*. It was also featured in the film *The Frighteners* and in the theatrical trailer for *High Tension*. It also appeared in professional skateboarder Jerry Hsu's part in "Bag of Suck". Richard Carpenter has expressed his distaste for this version.
- Texas ska-punk band Gals Panic covered the song on their 1995 album I Think We Need Helicopters.
- English trance singer Jan Johnston in the early 2000s.
- Dogstar, a rock band best known for their bass guitarist, actor Keanu Reeves, covered the song on their 2000 album Happy Ending.
- Punk cover specialists Me First and the Gimme Gimmes, on 2004's *Ruin Jonny's Bar Mitzvah*; the original lyrics were set to the main riff from The Adolescents' "Kids of the Black Hole".
- Usher's homage to the now-late Vandross' version, on the 2005 *So Amazing: An All-Star Tribute to Luther Vandross* album, for which he received a Grammy nomination for Best Male R&B Vocal Performance.
- The Motels recorded "Superstar" for their 2007 album Clean Modern and Reasonable.
- Shock of Pleasure did an ultra-chill version of "Superstar" for the 2008 album It's About Time.
- In 2009 a recording was made using Megurine Luka, a singer from the synthesizer program Vocaloid.
- Performed by Chrissie Hynde with James Walbourne of The Pretenders for a 2009 UK TV special entitled "Remembering the Carpenters". [3]
- French rapper Skyzo Starr used this song for the track "I Love You" in 2010.
- The chorus of the song is featured in the song "It's Alright" on American rapper Saigon's debut album The Greatest Story Never Told in 2011.



"Power of Love/Love Power" is the title of a number-one R&B hit by Luther Vandross released on April 9, 1991 as the lead single from his 1991 album of the same name. The hit song spent two weeks at number-one on the US R&B chart, and peaked at number four on the US pop chart, becoming his biggest pop solo hit.

The song is a medley of two songs titled "Power of Love" and "Love Power." "Love Power" had been a minor hit in 1968 for the one-hit wonder R&B group The Sandpebbles. The Sandpebbles version of "Love Power" had made it number twenty-two on the Hot 100, and number fourteen on the R&B singles chart.

Donna Summer recorded a version of the song for the 2005 album So Amazing: An All-Star Tribute to Luther Vandross.

"The Best Things in Life Are Free" is a duet between singers Luther Vandross and Janet Jackson, recorded for the Jimmy Jam and Terry Lewis-produced soundtrack to the 1992 film, *Mo' Money*, starring Damon Wayans. It was later included on the compilations *Design of a Decade 1986/1996* (1995), *One Night with You: The Best of Love, Volume 2* (1997), *Lovesongs* (2009) and *Number Ones* (2009). The song was composed by Jam, Lewis and New Edition/Bell Biv DeVoe members Michael Bivins and Ronnie DeVoe.

Background

In March 1991, Jackson signed an unprecedented \$32 million contract with Virgin Records, the largest record deal at the time even if it was quickly exceeded by her brother Michael and his label, Epic Records. Prior to her first release with Virgin, Jackson was asked by Jam and Lewis to record a song for the sound track to the feature film *Mo' Money*, released in 1992 by their label Perspective Records. Jon Bream of the *Star Tribune* reported: "For most movie soundtracks, producers negotiate with record companies, managers and lawyers for the services of big-name singers. Like the Hollywood outsiders that they are, Edina-based Jam and Lewis went directly to such stars as Janet Jackson, Luther Vandross, Bell Biv Devoe, Color Me Badd and Johnny Gill." A remixed version was later released in 1995.

"The Best Things in Life Are Free" is an R&B, dance-pop and house song with a "steady beat." It is written in the key of F#m and their vocal ranges span from the low-note of F#2 to C#5. The song is set in the signature of common time and has a moderate tempo of 120 pulsations per minute. It follows the basic chord progression of B7m—C#7m—F#7.

Informations

Jackson and Vandross were nominated for a Grammy Award for "Best R&B Performance by a Duo or Group with Vocals" for recording the song.

It was the first all-new song Jackson recorded at the new location of Flyte Tyme Studios in Edina, MN, which was completed 2 months after wrapping up recording on her fourth studio album Rhythm Nation 1814 in May 1989 at the original Minneapolis studio. [2] She had done re-recordings and remixes there from 1989 to 1991.

For the first time, Jackson included the song on her 2011 tour, Number Ones: Up Close and Personal.

Chart performance

In the United States, "The Best Things in Life Are Free" debuted at number 24 on the U.S. Billboard Hot 100 the week of May 30, 1992. Three weeks later, the song peaked at number 10 for three consecutive weeks and ended at number 41 on the year-end chart. The song also peaked at number one on the Hot R&B/Hip-Hop Songs.

In the United Kingdom the song was released in August 1992 and peaked at #2 in the UK Singles Chart, spending 13 weeks in the chart. It became her first top ten hit in the UK since "Let's Wait Awhile" reached #3 in 1987. The song was remixed in 1995 and re-released, reaching #7. It was the remixed version that was included on international releases of Janet's compilation album *Design of a Decade 1986/1996*.

It spent 5 consecutive weeks at #2 on the Australian Singles Chart, spending 18 weeks on the chart, And charting at #6 On the Year ends chart.^[3]

Music video

The video features cameos by Damon and Marlon Wayans and Stacey Dash, but neither Vandross nor Jackson appear in the video. A rap from Bell Biv Devoe and a spoken part by Ralph Tresvant are also in the song. It has never been commercially released.

Cover versions

A cover by British glamour model Katie Price and her now estranged husband, pop singer Peter Andre, was included on their 2006 album *A Whole New World*.

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

"Endless Love" is a song written by Lionel Richie and originally recorded as a duet between Richie and fellow soul singer Diana Ross. In this ballad, the singers declare their "endless love" for one another. It was covered by soul singer Luther Vandross with R&B singer Mariah Carey and also by country music singer Kenny Rogers with Dolly Parton. *Billboard* has named it the greatest song duet of all time.

About the record

Ross and Richie recorded the song for Motown, and it was used as the theme for the Franco Zeffirelli's film *Endless Love* starring Brooke Shields. Produced by Richie and arranged by Gene Page, it was released as a single from the film's soundtrack in 1981. While the film *Endless Love* was not a success, the song became the second biggest-selling single of the year (first was "Bette Davis Eyes" by Kim Carnes) in the U.S. and reached number 1 on the Hot 100, where it stayed for nine weeks from August 15 to October 10, 1981. It also topped the Billboard R&B

chart and the Adult Contemporary chart, and reached number 7 in the UK.

The soulful composition became the biggest-selling single of Ross' career and her 18th career number-one single (including her work with The Supremes), while it was the first of several hits for Richie during the 1980s. Ross recorded a solo version of the song for her first RCA Records album, *Why Do Fools Fall in Love*, the duet version being her last hit on Motown. The song was nominated for an Academy Award for Best Original Song for Richie, and was the second song with which Ross was involved that was nominated for an Oscar. It also won a 1982 American Music Award for Favorite Pop/Rock Single.



Walter Afanasieff produced Luther Vandross and Mariah Carey's cover of the song for Vandross' Epic Records-released album *Songs*, and it is known for being Carey's first "high-profile" duet (an earlier duet, "I'll Be There," was with the then-unknown background singer Trey Lorenz). At the 1995 Grammy Award's, the song was nominated in the new category of Best Pop Collaboration with Vocals, losing to "Funny How Time Slips Away" by Al Green and Lyle Lovett. Columbia Records later included the song on Carey's compilation album *Greatest Hits* (2001) and then again on her next compilation album, *The Ballads* (2008). It was released as the second single from *Songs* in 1994.

Recording

Sony Music Entertainment President Tommy Mottola suggested that Vandross record *Songs*, an album of cover versions. Featuring Vandross' versions of songs like Stephen Stills' "Love the One You're With," Heatwave's "Always and Forever," and Roberta Flack's "Killing Me Softly," the album was shaping up to be a major career accomplishment. To give the album a bigger boost, Mottola's wife, Mariah Carey, came up with the idea to remake "Endless Love" as a duet with her. Lionel Richie and Diana Ross had originally recorded "Endless Love" in 1981, and the song spent nine weeks at number 1. Although Luther's album was already set to contain one Lionel Richie composition, "Hello," it was obvious that having the most-popular female singer on the Sony label singing on the album would be a benefit.^[2]

Critical reception

Allmusic senior editor Stephen Thomas Erlewine highlighted this track.^[3] Entertainment Weekly's Jeremy Helligar wrote that if Luther wants a No. 1 he needs something less drippy than "Endless Love."^[4]

Chart performance

"Endless Love" debuted on September 10, 1994 at number 31 and peaked at number 2 being held back from the top position by Boyz II Men's "I'll Make Love to You". The song became Luther Vandross' biggest pop hit ever and gave Lionel Richie his first top ten as a songwriter in seven years. It became Vandross's fifth top-ten single and Carey's twelfth. It remained in the top forty for thirteen weeks, and was ranked number 56 on the Hot 100 1994 year-end charts. It was also an improvement over Carey's previous single, "Anytime You Need a Friend," which had missed the top ten. It was certified gold by the RIAA.

The song was a success outside the U.S, reaching the top of the chart in New Zealand (for five weeks) and the top five in the United Kingdom, Australia, Ireland, and the Netherlands. It also reached the top 20 in most of the countries. It was certified gold in Australia by ARIA and in New Zealand by RIANZ.

Total sales in the UK stand at 230,000.^[10]

Music video

Two music videos were released for the single; one features Carey and Vandross recording the song in a studio, and the other shows the two performing the song live at Royal Albert Hall. The latter performance is included on the Luther Vandross: From Luther with Love music video collection in DVD format.

Some versions of the song itself were released, in which Carey or Vandross sings solo.

Song appearances

The song was included in Adam Sandler's movie *Happy Gilmore* when Happy and his girlfriend Virginia are ice skating, and the song begins to play. Virginia says to Happy "I thought we were just going to be friends." To which he responds, "What, friends listen to 'Endless Love' in the dark."

In A Night at the Roxbury, there was a wedding going on with the couple singing the song, and the Butabis were dancing.

The song was included as well in the third season of *Friends*, in which Phoebe walks into Chandler's apartment, to find him singing the song and holding Lionel Richie's first album (even though the song is included on his fourth album, *Back to Front*). [33]

On an episode of *The Steve Harvey Show*, Steve and Regina perform the song at a janitor's urging (who thought they were Ross and Richie); at the end of the song, the janitor quips "no wonder you guys haven't had a hit in a while."

On an episode of *Glee* Matthew Morrison, the Glee Club instructor and Lea Michele as one of his students (Rachel) sing the song as a duet in class with Lea Michele remarking in an interior monologue, "I never noticed before, but Mr. Shue is really cute." This leads to a series of increasingly embarrassing high school crush scenes.

Live cover performances

The song has been performed four times on *American Idol*, by Rickey Smith, Chris Sligh, Danny Gokey, and Deandre Brackensick. The song was also performed on *Australian Idol* in 2007 by eventual winner Natalie Gauci on the Final 7 Birth Year (the contestants performed songs from the year they were born) theme night. It was also performed by Whitney Houston and her brother Gary Houston in some of her 1997-1998 concerts, including the Classic Whitney concert in Washington D.C.



"Always and Forever" is an R&B song written by Rod Temperton and first recorded by the British-based multinational funk-disco band Heatwave in 1976. Released as a single in 1977, the song is included on Heatwave's debut album *Too Hot to Handle* and has been covered by numerous artists.

Heatwave version

After the international success of Heatwave's debut single, the disco song "Boogie Nights", "Always and Forever" was chosen as the U.S. follow-up single in late 1977. A ballad featuring lead vocals by Johnnie Wilder, Jr., "Always and Forever" stood out among the band's predominantly disco repertoire and became a successful U.S. hit song in early 1978. It reached #18 on the *Billboard* Hot 100 in March of that year after peaking at #2 on the *Billboard* R&B chart, the band's highest showing on that tally. The single was certified platinum by the RIAA. [1] In the UK, the songs "Too Hot to Handle" and "The Groove Line" were released before a double A-sided "Always and Forever" / "Mind Blowing Decisions" was issued in November 1978. This became the band's second top ten on the UK Singles Chart when it spent two weeks at #9 in December of that year.

"Always and Forever"

In the late 1970s through the 1980s it was a popular "slow dance" song at high school proms, particularly in inner-city areas with a high minority population. The song was also played during the slow dance scene in the movie *House Party*.

In the liner notes to Heatwave's 1996 compilation album *The Best of Heatwave: Always and Forever*, music writer and former *Billboard* contributor Brian Chin notes that Wilder "says that it was right around the time of the single release of "Always and Forever" that he knew Heatwave's music would stand the test of time. This pop standard is emblematic of the Heatwave fusion of influences - R&B, teen romance, and both European and American flavors of pop." AllMusic reviewer Craig Lytle states that the song "was and continues to be an ageless piece. Johnnie Wilder's vocal exhibition throughout the vamp is breathtaking."

Among many artists who have recorded versions of "Always and Forever" is the American R&B vocal group Whistle, who released their single in 1990 from their album of the same name. Their take on the song made the top ten on the *Billboard* R&B chart, peaking at #9, while also cracking the top of the Hot 100 at #35. [6] R&B-pop vocalist Luther Vandross released his cover of "Always and Forever" as the second single from his 1994 album, *Songs*. His recording earned him a Grammy Award nomination in the category Best Male R&B Vocal performance at the Grammy Awards of 1995 and placed on four *Billboard* charts, with its best showing on the R&B chart where it reached #16. Vandross' single made the Hot 100 at #58 and also appeared on *Billboard* adult contemporary and

rhythmic top 40 charts.^[7]

"Ain't No Stoppin' Us Now" is a disco song performed by R&B duo McFadden & Whitehead from their debut album, *McFadden & Whitehead*. They wrote and produced this along with keyboard player Jerry Cohen. Released from their self-titled debut album in 1979, the song spent a week at number one on the R&B singles chart. It also proved to be a successful crossover hit, peaking at number thirteen on the Billboard Hot 100, and reached number 5 in the UK. The single also made it to number ten on the disco charts. The bass hook was played by Philadelphia International Records house musician Jimmy Williams. The song eventually sold over 2 million copies and went platinum. In 1979 New York radio station WBLS 107.5 fm used this song as their Summer Anthem. This was a creative feature that was done by radio personality and also program director Frankie Crocker when the station became number one in arbitron radio ratings that year.

McFadden & Whitehead would revisit the song in their 1984 single, "Ain't No Stoppin' (Ain't No Way)."

Covers

- UK dance group Undercover released their own version of the song, naming their third album after the song in
- Luther Vandross did a cover version of this song for his 1994 cover album *Songs*. His version of the song was also performed as a duet with British girl group the Spice Girls for their *An Audience With...* special on the UK's ITV1 in 1997, and later appeared as a B-Side to their single *Stop*.
- In 1996, the jazz fusion\contemporary jazz group, The Rippingtons recorded a cover version for their album *Brave New World*, and also Kate Pierson and Cindy Wilson, both of The B-52s, recorded the song for the 96's soundtrack *The Associate*.
- Additionally, in 2005, smooth jazz artist Ben Tankard did a gospel/jazz rendition of the song on his *Piano* Prophet CD as well as Wayman Tisdale, who recorded a cover version of this song for his album "Hang Time."
- The song was supposedly a declaration on how far African Americans had come from the past. The song has served as a celebration of black achievements. However, in an interview conducted by Philadelphia video producer Bob Lott, John and Gene revealed that the song was actually about their frustration with Philadelphia International Records owners Kenny Gamble and Leon Huff, who for many years preferred that they remain as house songwriters and not performers. Gamble has confirmed that upon first hearing "Ain't No Stoppin' Us Now", he tried unsuccessfully to convince McFadden and Whitehead give the song to The O'Jays, as he felt it was better to write and produce for the prominent recording artists of the day than to try to compete with them as on-stage performers.
- George Michael covered the song during his Cover to Cover tour in 1991. He also released a demo version under the name "Trojan Souls".
- The Chipmunks and The Chipettes covered this song for the Alvin and the Chipmunks: Chipwrecked: Music from the Motion Picture album and for the "Alvin and the Chipmunks: Chipwrecked" film. This version is mashed with Lady Gaga's "Born This Way" and Katy Perry's "Firework".

Popular usage

The song is frequently played at sporting and political events, and TV shows often use it.

- "Ain't No Stoppin' Us Now" was played at the 2008 Democratic National Convention on the night Illinois Senator Barack Obama accepted the Democratic Party (United States) nomination for President of the United States.
- "Ain't No Stoppin' Us Now" is the Theme Song for the University of Arkansas at Pine Bluff Marching Band, Known As "The Marching Musical Machine of the Mid-South also known as "M4". The UAPB Marching Band, under the direction of Professor John R.Graham, Jr. performed the song as they marched by the viewing stand for the 56th Inaugural Parade for President Barack Obama..
- The song served as the 1980 theme song for the Philadelphia Phillies, 1980-81 Philadelphia Eagles and 2000-2001 Philadelphia 76ers. (McFadden and Whitehead sung a Phillies, Eagles and Sixers version of Ain't No Stoppin' Us Now. For example, "Ain't No Stoppin' Us Now, the Phillies got the groove").
- The song is played at the end of Detroit Red Wings games when they're victorious.
- The song served as the theme song for former heavyweight champion of the world and boxing hall-of-famer Larry Holmes.
- Davidson samples this song in his song "All I Wanna Do", heard on the *Grand Theft Auto 2* soundtrack.
- This song is also the ring walk song of the former WBA Heavyweight title holder and former The Ring WBA,WBC & WBO Cruiserweight champion of the world, David Haye
- This song was also featured in the movie *Boogie Nights*.
- Colson Whitehead refers to the song in his novel Sag Harbor as "the black national anthem" during the 1980s.
- Diddy-Dirty Money references the song in their song "Coming Home"
- Jocko Henderson samples this song in his 1979 single "Rhythm Talk"

• Lethal P used this song on his 2005 mixtape 'Always Outnumbered, Always Scarper'

"Dance with My Father" is the title track to singer-songwriter Luther Vandross' thirteenth studio album. With Richard Marx, Vandross wrote the song based on his personal experience. Its poignant lyrics recall childhood memories with Vandross' father, who used to dance with his mother.

Despite the lack of promotion due in part to Vandross' hospitalization, "Dance with My Father" became one of the most requested songs at the time. During the 2003 Grammy Awards, "Dance with My Father" earned Vandross the Song of the Year and Best Male R&B Vocal Performance accolades.

Composition and release

Vandross wrote "Dance with my Father", with Marx, based on his personal experience. Considered by Vandross as his "career song", "Dance with my Father" is a tribute to his father, Luther Vandross, Sr., who died due to complications of diabetes. Vandross was seven when his father died. According to Marx, writing the song was emotional for Vandross because it is "a subject matter [Vandross] hadn't written before".

On the backdrop of strings and interplay of piano and drums, Vandross recalls fond memories with his late father who used to dance with his mother. Mary Ida, his mother, says, "I was amazed at how well Luther remembered his father, how we used to dance and sing in the house. I was so surprised that at 7 1/2 years of age, he could remember what a happy household we had." Barry Walters of *Rolling Stone* magazine qualifies the memories invoked in the lyrics as painful and private, adding that when Vandross asks God to return his father, it "turn a potentially maudlin song into a meditative, deeply personal prayer".



Illinois native Richard Marx co-wrote "Dance with My Father" with Vandross.

At the time of "Dance with my Father"'s release as a single on May 30,

2003, Vandross had been hospitalized due to his suffering from stroke. This timely release of the song gained attention from critics. On his review for the album, David Jeffries of Allmusic wrote that its release "makes the song's references to absent loved ones even more poignant". For Larry Flick of *The Advocate*, it transformed the song into "a haunting composition rife with subtext".

"Dance with My Father"

Reception

Although Vandross was unable to promote the latest project, "Dance with My Father" was able to reach number one on music stations. For instance, it achieved top position in WLTW, which was one of the first stations in the United States to play the track. Before his stroke, Vandross wrote to WLTW's program director, informing him of what he considered to be his "career song". The director asked permission from the label, but it was not until after the hospitalization that J Records permitted the airplay, following the song being featured in *Boston Public* on April 28, 2003. "Dance with My Father" became one of the most requested songs at the time, spawning "a number of weepy phone calls and requests".

In February 2003, "Dance with My Father" earned Vandross and Marx a Grammy Award for Song of the Year and Vandross a Grammy Award for Best Male R&B Vocal Performance. Marx accepted the award in behalf of Vandross, who was unable to attend due to health concerns. At the same event, singer Celine Dion performed a live rendition of the song in lieu of Vandross, and Marx accompanied her on the piano. After the performance, Vandross however accepted the awards on a videotaped speech.

"Dance With My Father" was the last top 40 hit for the late Luther Vandross in his homeland, United States, peaking at number 38. The song also peaked at 21 in the UK Singles Chart. On August 29, 2009, the song re-entered the top 40 after a performance of the song on the British hit TV show X Factor by Joe McElderry. The song entered the UK Singles Chart on December 20, 2009 at number 48.

Music video

While Vandross was hospitalized, a music video was shot for the single. Hosting famous friends of his and fans alike, the clip features musicians, actors and sport stars. The video features childhood snapshots of Vandross.

One of the singers who made appearance on the video is Beyoncé Knowles, alongside her father, Mathew. Knowles had collaborated with Vandross in the remake of the 1978 song "The Closer I Get To You", which also appears on *Dance With My Father* album.

Versions and appearances



Singer Celine Dion recorded a cover version of "Dance with My Father" which appeared on the So Amazing: An All-Star Tribute to Luther Vandross album.

"Dance with My Father" has been released in various cover versions, and has appeared in many albums. Released in 2004, country music singer Kellie Coffey recorded a cover version of the song which peaked at number 41 on the *Billboard* Hot Country Singles & Tracks (now Hot Country Songs) charts. It was included on her unreleased second studio album, *A Little More Me*. Lyn Paul recorded the song for inclusion on her 2006 album *Late Night*.

The song has appeared on various tribute albums to Vandross. For one, Dion, who also lost a father early in 2003, covered the song for the *So Amazing: An All-Star Tribute to Luther Vandross* album, which was compiled shortly after Vandross' death. Two years later, it was

included on her greatest hits album My Love: Ultimate Essential Collection.

In 2009, *The X Factor* winner Joe McElderry covered this song in his audition on the sixth series of the show. In the final, he sang the song again and was crowned winner. He sang the song at various gigs and eventually recorded the song in 2011 for his second studio album, *Classic*. This version premiered on Magic Radio on August 7, 2011. A stripped live performance was used as the music video for McElderry's version. The video premiered on Entertainment Focus on September 13, 2011. [1]

"Dance with My Father"

Filipino R&B singer Jay R covered the song in 2010, and is featured as a bonus track for his fifth studio album, *Jay R Sings OPM Love Classics*.

In April 25, 2012, American Idol Season 11 contestant Jessica Sanchez performed the song during the show's Top 6 performance night. American Idol judges even praised her for her performance. Jennifer Lopez, one of the judges of American Idol even said "That may have been the best I've ever heard that song sung". Sanchez told Ryan Seacrest, the host of the show that she is dedicating her performance for her father who will be deployed to Singapore as a soldier.

"Buy Me a Rose" is the title of a song written by Jim Funk and Erik Hickenlooper, and recorded by American country music artist Kenny Rogers. It was released in October 1999 as the third single from his album *She Rides Wild Horses*. Upon reaching Number One on the *Billboard* Hot Country Singles & Tracks (now Hot Country Songs) charts in May 2000, the song made Rogers (who was 61 years old at the time) the oldest country singer to have a Number One hit.

"Buy Me a Rose" was not only his first Number One single since 1987's "Make No Mistake, She's Mine" (a duet with Ronnie Milsap), but also the only Number One for both Alison Krauss and Billy Dean, both of whom received chart credit for performing background vocals on the song. It was also Rogers' only Number One for his personal label, Dreamcatcher Records.

"Buy Me a Rose"

Content

"Buy Me a Rose" is a ballad, telling of a husband who attempts to please his wife with material objects, such as a "three-car garage and her own credit cards." The wife remains unsatisfied, however, as she prefers simpler gestures, such as the husband purchasing her a rose from a florist, or having a door held open for her, implying that he should also mind his manners. By the third verse, the singer reveals that he is actually the husband in the story; in addition, he states that he has finally realized what his wife desires. The song ends with him finally making that realization ("So I bought you a rose on the way home from work...").

Chart performance

"Buy Me a Rose" entered the *Billboard* Hot Country Singles & Tracks chart at number 62 on the chart dated October 30, 1999, reaching Number One in May 2000, and spending a total of thirty-seven weeks on the charts. It is also the only Number One single for Billy Dean and Alison Krauss, both of whom received chart credit for their backing vocals. Rogers, who was 61 at the time the song peaked, also set a record for the oldest singer to have a No. 1 hit on the country charts. Rogers held this record for three years until it was broken by Willie Nelson who, at age 70, reached Number One as a duet partner on Toby Keith's 2003 single "Beer for My Horses".

"The Closer I Get to You" is a romantic ballad performed by American jazz, soul, R&B, and folk singer-songwriter Roberta Flack and American soul musician Donny Hathaway. The song was written by James Mtume and Reggie Lucas, two former members of Miles Davis' band, who were members of Flack's band at the time. Produced by Atlantic Records, the song was released on Flack's 1977 album *Blue Lights in the Basement*, and as a single in 1978. It became a major crossover hit, becoming Flack's biggest commercial hit after her success with her 1973 solo single, "Killing Me Softly with His Song". Originally set as a solo-single, Flack's manager, David Franklin, suggested a duet with Hathaway, which resulted in the finished work.

"The Closer I Get to You" spent two weeks as number one on the Hot Soul Singles chart in April 1978, and peaked at number two on the *Billboard* Hot 100. The song charted in the top ten spots for fourteen weeks in Canada and one

week in France. It was eventually certified gold in the United States on May 1978, and became one of their most familiar duets.

Background and composition

"The Closer I Get to You" was written by Reggie Lucas and James Mtume, who were members of Roberta Flack's touring band and played on *Blue Lights in the Basement*. After forming a songwriting partnership, they left Miles Davis and attempted (unsuccessfully) to break into the record business, before finally joining Roberta Flack's band. They wrote the song between tours and, during the sessions for the album, brought it to Flack's producer Joe Ferla, who played it for Flack. Rubina Flake and Gene McDaniels also produced the song, and Ahmet Ertegun served as its executive producer. Flack and Donny Hathaway, good friends while attending Howard University, recorded an album of duets in 1972. Five years later, the duo collaborated again on "The Closer I Get to You". "The Closer I Get To You" marks the second time Flack and Hathaway collaborated on a duet together, the first being "Where Is the Love", released in 1973.

"The Closer I Get to You" was not originally written as a duet. Flack's manager David Franklin, who had worked with Hathaway in the past, decided to re-write the song to include him. Hathaway had been suffering from severe bouts of depression at the time, which often forced him to be hospitalized. The depression also caused mood swings, which adversely affected his partnership with Flack. After Flack and Hathaway were reconciled, the producers had to get permission from the hospital to fly Hathaway out for the recording sessions. Following Hathaway's death in 1979, Flack revealed the importance of recording the song in an interview with *Jet*, stating:

I tried to reach out to Donny. That's how we managed to do the song we did last year. I felt this need because I didn't know what to do. I couldn't save him, I knew he was sick. But I knew when he sat down at that piano and sang for me it was like it was eight or nine years ago because he sang and played his ass off.

Flack announced that "The Closer I Get to You" would forever be a dedication to Hathaway, and that all money made from the song would be donated to Hathaway's wife and two kids, stating "All of that money is going to his family. Any portion that would have been mine is going to go to his wife and two kids." According to the sheet music published at Musicnotes.com by Sony/ATV Music Publishing, "The Closer I Get to You" is set in common time and moves at a tempo of 90 beats per minute. The song is written in the key of A major and follows the chord progression $D_{maj9} - C\sharp_{m7} - F\sharp_{m7} - A_{maj7}$. Flack sings in the vocal range of $C\sharp_4 - F\sharp_5$. "The Closer I Get to You" was released as a 7" single with "Love is the Healing" as its B-side.

Reception

Critical reception and accolades

Critics described "The Closer I Get to You" as Flack at the top of her form. The song came in at number 40 on Billboard' poll of "The 40 Biggest Duets Of All Time", where it was described a "tender tune". Authors of All Music Guide To Rock: The Definitive Guide to Rock, Pop, and Soul described the song as ethereal. Alan Light of Vibe magazine characterized it as intimate and effortless as an overheard conversation. Author of 1001 Ways to Be Romantic, Gregory J. P. Godek, included the song in a list of "Best Love Song Duets". A writer of Jet magazine described the song as a "pop-soul classic". Carolyn Quick Tillery, author of Celebrating Our Equality, described the song as a lasting musical legacy. Devon Jarvis of Women's Health included Flack and Hathaway's version of "The Closer I Get to You" in "Favorite Karaoke Duets". While opening the "R&B Vault", Gail Mitchell of Billboard praised the song as a 1970s-era classic. While reviewing Blue Lights in the Basement, Jason Elias of the website Allmusic wrote, "The track easily attains the grace and gorgeous sound that a lot of the like-minded songs here just miss." Lewis Dene of BBC described "The Closer I Get to You" as a "soul masterpiece". Both Hathaway and Flack were nominated for a Grammy Award for their duet.

Chart performance

The song became the duo's second number one on the US R&B charts in 1978, and climbed to the number two spot on the Pop charts. "The Closer I Get to You" also peaked at number three on the Adult Contemporary charts.

Music video

A music video for "The Closer I Get to You" was shot and directed by Roberta Flack herself. The video begins with Flack's singing while sitting by a piano in a candle-lit room. Hathaway had died by the time the music video was shot, so as his verse plays, the camera zooms into a picture of Hathaway located on a table behind Flack's shoulder. Flack performs the rest of the song sitting by the piano, and the camera's direction occasionally looks over a candle flame during Hathaway's verses. The video ends with Flack's mouthing some of Hathaway's lyrics as she fades into the camera's view of the room lit by a single candle. A version of Flack's performing the song live circulated as its promotional music video.

Beyoncé Knowles' and Luther Vandross' 2003 cover version of the song appeared on both Vandross' final album *Dance with My Father* and Knowles' solo debut *Dangerously in Love*. Their version was recorded at the The Hit Factory and the Right Track Studios, in New York City. It follows a tempo of 98 beats per minute, slightly faster than the original version. It is set in the key of Eb major, and follows the chord progression $G_{m7} - C_{m7} - Eb_{maj9} - Ab$. It was serviced to US urban contemporary and urban adult contemporary radio on June 13, 2004.

Reception

Sal Cinquemani of Slant Magazine called the song "dated" and wrote that it felt out of place on *Dangerously in Love*. Erika Ramirez of *Billboard* magazine also noted that "While the singer holds her on alongside the legend, the quiet storm duet feels out of place considering the electrifying feel of majority of the album." Neil Drumming of *Entertainment Weekly* said: "A remake of 'The Closer I Get to You' with Luther Vandross also sounds, sadly, a little dated." Spence D. of IGN Music commented "By the time Beyoncé has teamed up with the granddaddy of contemporary love jams, Luthor Vandross, on 'The Closer I Get To You', her album has descended into somewhat generic terrain. Sure, her vocals are on point and the music is adequately slick." Anthony DeCurtis of *Rolling Stone* wrote, "While she oozes charisma and has a fine voice, Beyoncé isn't in a class with the likes of Whitney Houston or Mariah Carey as a singer, a fact that 'The Closer I Get to You', her duet with the effortlessly smooth Luther Vandross, also makes clear."

Jason King of *Vibe* magazine wrote that Knowles had some "cojones" to follow up a Jay-Z duet with a Luther Vandross duet on the album's track-listing. Rob Fitzpatrick of *NME* stated that "it's the irredeemably cheesy ballad with 80s cornball Luther Vandross that will make the voices in your head demand hot, fresh blood." By contrast, Lewis Dene of BBC gave the song a positive review, stating that it is guaranteed the number one slot on the US R&B charts. Consequence of Sound's Chris Coplan noted that the song contained "unintentional cheesy vibe, [which] seems way more heart-wrenching now [in 2013] than it did a decade ago" and added that Knowles' vocals contained a "real sweetness and innocence". Pamelia S. Phillips, the author of *Singing for Dummies*, credited Knowles' vocal performance on "The Closer I Get to You" as one of her best. Mark Anthony Neal of PopMatters gave Knowles and Vandross "vocal props" for their performance in the "quiet storm", but described the overall performance as flat. During the 46th Grammy Awards, this version of "The Closer I Get to You" won the Grammy Award for Best R&B Performance by a Duo or Group with Vocals.

Knowles and Vandross' cover of "The Closer I Get to You" debuted at number 76 on the US Hot R&B/Hip-Hop Singles and Tracks chart dated July 24, 2004. The next week it moved up to number 68, and on August 7 it peaked at number 62. The track spent a total of twenty weeks on the chart. On the airplay component of this chart, the Hot R&B/Hip-Hop Airplay, "The Closer I Get to You" spent eight weeks and reached a peak of number 60.

Other versions

"The Closer I Get To You" has been covered many times. The first was released by Mtume on their 1978 album *Kiss This World Goodbye*, sung by James Mtume and Tawatha Agee. In 1994, a cover was recorded by the smooth jazz band Fourplay for their third studio album *Elixir* which featured R&B and smooth jazz singers Patti Austin and Peabo Bryson. Fourplay's cover of the song was described as an "undistinguished version" of the original song by Allmusic's Steven McDonald. In 1998, Dennis Brown covered the song with Janet Kay for his compilation album *The Prime of Dennis Brown*. This version of the song contains digital keyboards and slick production. The song was also included on Brown's compilation album *Money in My Pocket: Anthology 1970-1995*. In 2005, Nina Girado covered the song with Thor for her album live album *Nina Live!*. A writer of *The Philippine Star* noted that Thor "matches Nina note for note on their duet". Girado's version of the song won in the category for Best Duet Award at the Awit Awards in 2006. It was covered by Filipino acoustic band MYMP on their 2005 album *Versions*. Contemporary jazz guitarist Peter White covered the song on his rendition-packed album *Reflections*. Saxophonist Kim Waters included a version of the song on his 2007 album *You Are My Lady*. It features the vocals by R&B singer Lisa Fischer.

On an episode of *New York Undercover*, guest star singers Brandy and Tevin Campbell sang the duet at Natalie's (a club in the TV series owned by Jose Perez character Mike Torres). On an episode of *Martin*, Gina (played by Tisha Campbell-Martin) and singer Keith Washington performed, "The Closer I Get to You" at a party Gina was hosting. In the film *Rush Hour 3*, when Chris Tucker and Jackie Chan are at the French theater and the play has stopped, the song is sung by Tucker and Chan, with Tucker singing it in a high-pitched voice.

"Shine" is a single by soul legend Luther Vandross, the first single from his greatest hits package *The Ultimate Luther Vandross*.

"Shine" is an upbeat R&B track that samples Chic's disco classic "My Forbidden Lover". "Shine" became a top 20 Urban radio hit, and the club mixes of the song (particularly the Freemasons Club Mix) became popular on Dance format radio stations and clubs in the US. The single was also a top fifty hit in the UK but failed to chart on the US Billboard Hot 100.

The song originally was made for the original soundtrack to the movie *The Fighting Temptations*, but failed to make the final cut. The clue for this is in the first verse, where the title to the movie is mentioned.

Due to the club mix of the Luther Vandross version of "Shine" becoming so popular, the song was covered by UK dance duo Booty Luv, who released it as their second single less than one year from the original release of the track.

"Shine" was released in the United Kingdom via the Hed Kandi label on May 14, 2007. The digital EP and single were available since May 7, 2007 in the UK and France iTunes Store. The EP was then released to the US iTunes Store on July 15, 2008.

"Shine" was well received by radio and was added to the BBC Radio 1's A-playlist. It peaked at number seventeen on the UK airplay chart and number ten on the UK Singles Chart.

"Voices That Care" is a 1991 song written by David Foster, Linda Thompson and Peter Cetera and recorded by a supergroup of popular musicians, entertainers and athletes. The group of people involved was also collectively known as Voices That Care and was shown as such on the single release and marketing materials. The single and supporting documentary music video were intended to help boost the morale of U.S. troops involved in Operation Desert Storm, as well as supporting the International Red Cross organization. The documentary, which followed the recording of the single to the music video's presentation to the troops in the Middle East, aired on Fox on February 28, 1991.

However, as fighting in Desert Storm also ended on February 28, the purpose and impact of the song immediately became outdated. Nevertheless, "Voices That Care" reached number 11 on the Billboard Hot 100 and number 6 on the Hot Adult Contemporary Tracks.

Warren Wiebe, a friend of Foster and little-known vocalist at the time who recorded the demo of the song, was invited by Foster to sing lead and deliver the last solo lines of the song.

"A House Is Not a Home" is a 1964 song recorded by American singer Dionne Warwick, and written by the team of Burt Bacharach and Hal David for the 1964 film of the same name, starring Shelley Winters and Richard Todd. The song was a modest hit in the U.S. for Warwick, peaking at #71 on the pop singles chart as the B-side of the top 40 single, "You'll Never Get to Heaven (If You Break My Heart)". Two weeks earlier, a competing version by Brook Benton had debuted on the Billboard Hot 100. Benton's version split airplay with Warwick's, and ultimately peaked at number seventy-five. The Brook Benton version of the tune was used as the theme for the film of the same name.

Warwick's version of "A House Is Not a Home", originally written in the key of F major, fared better in Canada, where it was a top 40 hit, peaking at #37. The song made the R&B top 10 in Cashbox by both Warwick and Benton, with neither artist specified as best seller.

Psychedelic band Love parodied the song's title on their album *Forever Changes* in 1967, by naming one of their songs "A House Is Not a Motel".

Peter Hammill parodied the title on his album *The Silent Corner and the Empty Stage* in 1974, naming the lengthy final number "A Louse Is Not a Home".

Cover versions

English rock duo The Marbles performed the song and was released on the group's 1970 self-titled album.^[1]

Dusty Springfield performed the song with Bacharach on the 1970 television special *Another Evening With Burt Bacharach* (a performance she was "quite proud of"). [2]

The song was an outtake in the sessions that produced the 1968 album *Diana Ross & the Supremes Join the Temptations*. It is available on the compilation *Joined Together: The Complete Studio Duets*, a 2004 Motown CD.


((Rouvaun)) recorded this song on his 1969 album "From The Heart of Man"

Barbra Streisand recorded a medley of the song with "One Less Bell to Answer" (the 5th Dimension hit) for her 1971 album *Barbra Joan Streisand*.

Boy Mondragon covered this song under Vicor Records.

Sonny Rollins recorded a version at the 1974 Montreux Jazz Festival released on *The Cutting Edge*.



The song was covered by R&B singer Luther Vandross, whose version became an R&B hit in 1981. His performance of the song at the 1988 NAACP Awards telecast would bring Warwick to tears. Vandross' version would be sampled two decades after that by Kanye West on his, Jamie Foxx's and Twista's hit, "Slow Jamz", in 2004.

The song has also been frequently featured on the popular television show *American Idol*, with performances by Tamyra Gray, Ruben Studdard, Anwar Robinson, Elliott Yamin and Jacob Lusk. Season 3 runner-up Diana DeGarmo also sang the song in the musical revue, Back to Bacharach and David in 2009 that was directed by Kathy Najimy.

Bill Evans recorded the song for his 1977 album *I Will Say Goodbye* in the key of B flat major, and other notable jazz musicians such as Sonny Rollins have performed and recorded the song—it has thus acquired the status of a jazz standard.

In 1993, pianist Joe Sample did a cover of this song on the album Invitation.

The Luther Vandross version can be heard in the background in the Pilot Episode of Fox's 1993 sitcom, The Sinbad Show.

In 1995, another instrumental rendition was released on saxophonist Nelson Rangell's album "Destiny."

Stevie Wonder covered the song on his album Eivets Rednow.

Ronald Isley would record his own version with Bacharach, using essentially the same template as Luther Vandross.

In 2005, Aretha Franklin covered the song for the tribute album So Amazing: An All-Star Tribute to Luther Vandross.

In 2002, Lynne Arriale covered the song on her album "Inspiration".

In the SpongeBob SquarePants episode, "Welcome to the Chum Bucket", SpongeBob and Mr. Krabs sing a song entitled "A Grill Is Not a Home". It is rumored to be a parody of this song.

On the television series *Half* & *Half*, Adam (Alec Mapa) sings the song while the doorbell rings on the final season 4 episode "The Big Young & Restless episode" aired October 17, 2005.

Perry Como, Shirley Bassey, Ella Fitzgerald, Lulu and Georgie Fame also recorded the song.

In 2010, Kristin Chenoweth performed the song in the Broadway revival of *Promises*, *Promises*. Although the song was not part of the original show, it was added to showcase her voice and, as Bacharach and David had written all of the original score, it fit in perfectly, both dramatically and musically.

The song was also covered twice in "Home," the sixteenth episode of the TV series *Glee*, once by Chris Colfer and Cory Monteith, and once by Matthew Morrison and Kristin Chenoweth as part of a medley with "One Less Bell to Answer."

The song was covered by the Blue Devils Drum and Bugle Corps in their 2011 program, The Beat My Heart Skipped, which was a tribute to the music of Burt Bacharach.

In 2012, British pop group STEPS included a cover of the song on their album "Light Up The World".

"Georgy Porgy" is a song written by David Paich, released on Toto's self-titled debut album in 1978. It was released as a single and charted on the Billboard Hot 100 (#48) as well as on both the R&B (#18)^[2] and the Dance (#80) charts.

The lead vocals are performed by guitarist Steve Lukather. Cheryl Lynn provided the female backing vocal.

The song is still performed on tour. It is adapted with improvisational solos on guitar and keyboards. [3]

In an 1988 interview with Modern Drummer, Jeff Porcaro discussed developing the groove for "Georgy Porgy":

"...it's imitating Paul Humphrey heavily; it's imitating Earl Palmer very heavily. When it comes to that groove, my biggest influences were Paul Humphrey, Ed Greene, Earl Palmer, and the godfather of that 16th-note groove, James Gadson. That "Georgy Porgy" groove I owe to them."

Cover versions

A version by US soul band Charme was released in 1979 featuring an uncredited vocal by Luther Vandross. The single was re-released a few years later after the vocalist's rise in popularity and he was then credited as the featured artist. It remains a popular version in rare groove circles.

US disco/jazz-funk band Side Effect released their own version in 1980. It was on their "After The Rain" album. It made it to 77 in the US R&B charts.

In 1999, a cover version by Eric Benét (with Faith Evans on background vocals) was released as the first single from Benét's album *A Day in the Life*. Their version reached number two in New Zealand.

MC Lyte used this song as the musical foundation of "Poor Georgie", from her 1991 album *Act Like You Know*. The song was used by Devin the Dude in his song "Georgy" from album "The Dude (Devin the Dude album)" and by Guru in "Kissed the World" from album "Jazzmatazz, Vol. 4: The Hip-Hop Jazz Messenger: Back to the Future" also.

In 2002, Japanese musician Ringo Sheena formed the band Yokoshima (新) solely to play cover of Georgy Porgy.

In 2005, guitarist Nils offered a rendition of this song from his popular Contemporary jazz radio Baja/TSR Records released album, 'Pacific Coast Highway.' Its also sampled on the remix of Joe's "All Or Nothing" single from his 1994 album of the same name called the Georgy Porgy remix.

In 2009 a rearranged instrumental rendition was also done by Japanese artist DJ Deckstream^[5] on his Music Castle album.^[6]

"Jump to It" is the title track from Aretha Franklin's 1982 album, *Jump to It*, produced by Luther Vandross. The song was written by Vandross and Marcus Miller and features background vocals performed by Vandross and Cissy Houston. The single was a major success, holding the #1 spot on Billboard's Soul Chart for four consecutive weeks. "Jump to It" was also Aretha's biggest Pop hit since 1974, reaching #24 on Billboard's Hot 100 chart in October. The upbeat single also peaked at #4 on the dance charts. It was nominated for a Grammy Award and several American Music Awards.

"Anyone Who Had a Heart" is a song written by Burt Bacharach (music) and Hal David (lyrics) for Dionne Warwick in 1963. Warwick's original recording hit the Top Ten in the United States, Canada, Spain, The Netherlands, South Africa, Belgium and Australia in January 1964.

Cilla Black's version was a UK #1 hit in 1964: in May 2010 research published by BBC Radio 2 revealed that her version was the biggest female chart hit of the 1960s although that version, as well as Cilla Black, remains relatively unknown outside the UK and western Europe.

Original recording

"Anyone Who Had a Heart" was presented to Dionne Warwick in unfinished form while she, Burt Bacharach and Hal David were rehearsing in Bacharach's Manhattan apartment for an upcoming recording session. Bacharach had finished the score which, in his words, "changes time signature constantly, 4/4 to 5/4, and a 7/8 bar at the end of the song on the turnaround. It wasn't intentional, it was all just natural. That's the way I felt it." This was the first use of polyrhythm in popular music. However, David had written only about a third of the lyric and was reluctant to finalize the sixth line of the first stanza as "And know I dream of *you*", feeling the stress was unnatural (as opposed to "And know I *dream* of you"). Bacharach played a snippet of the tune for Warwick, who was enraptured and at her urging David left Warwick to rehearse with Bacharach in the living room while he (David) retired to a bedroom where he completed the lyric. Of the unnatural stress in "I dream of *you*", David later stated: "I tried to find a way to make the *you* do something and I could never do it...[I] had to let it go."

Warwick recorded "Anyone Who Had a Heart" at Bell Sound Studios in Manhattan in November 1963, in a session produced by Bacharach which also yielded "Walk On By" and "In the Land of Make Believe". According to published reports, Warwick nailed the tune in only one take – though an alternative remix of the take appears on a compilation album released in 1976 by Springboard International.

Released on the Scepter label in November 1963, "Anyone Who Had a Heart" broke in Detroit, where it reached #1 that December. The track became Warwick's first Top Ten single in January 1964, peaking at #8 on the *Billboard* Hot 100 and the *Cash Box* Pop 100 that February, also reaching #6 on the *Cash Box* R&B chart. The track was also a hit in Canada, reaching #11 on the hit parade for Toronto radio station CHUM, the country's most influential rock music broadcaster (national charts for Canada were not published during the chart run of "Anyone Who Had a Heart").

A scout for UK record producer George Martin discovered "Anyone Who Had a Heart" when Warwick's version took off in the US, suggesting to Martin that the song would be a strong UK single for Shirley Bassey. However, Martin saw the song as a vehicle for Cilla Black, the Liverpool vocalist whose star potential had yet to be realized despite her association with the Beatles, her recording of the Lennon-McCartney original "Love of the Loved" having been only a modest hit (#35). Martin produced the session for Black's recording of "Anyone Who Had a

Heart" at Abbey Road Studios; the arrangement was by Johnny Pearson and the session personnel included guitarists Vic Flick and Big Jim Sullivan and the Breakaways vocal group.

Black's single of "Anyone Who Had a Heart" debuted at #28 on the UK Top 50 dated 8 February 1964. The Dionne Warwick original, issued by Scepter's UK licensee Pye Records, debuted on the chart for the following week at #42; by then Black's version had reached #10, ascending in the subsequent two weeks to #2 and then #1 while Warwick's version concurrently ended its chart run with two weeks at #47. On the chart dated 29 February 1964, besides Black's "Anyone Who Had a Heart" at #1 for the first of three weeks and Warwick's version in its final chart week at #47, the UK Top 50 featured a third version of "Anyone Who Had a Heart" as the version by Mary May made its one week appearance at #49. On 25 April 1964, *Billboard* reported that the sales tally for Black's "Anyone Who Had a Heart" was nearing one million units.

"Anyone Who Had a Heart" was also a #1 hit for Cilla Black in Ireland, New Zealand and South Africa.

Despite the international success and recognition of Warwick's original version, the besting in Great Britain by Black's version has long been a sore point with Warwick. In a 1995 edition of *Great Performances* which saluted Burt Bacharach, Warwick stated that Black's version of "Anyone Who Had a Heart" replicated Warwick's to the point where had Warwick coughed while recording her vocal for the original track or had that track's organist hit a wrong note, those features would have been present on Black's cover. In fact — whether intentionally - Black's version features distinctly different lyrics on the chorus than those recorded by Warwick or are standard for the song. Also, arranger Johnny Pearson utilized a bassoon solo for the instrumental break in Black's version as opposed to the saxophone utilized in the Warwick original.

Cilla Black, interviewed for that *Great Performances* telecast, expressed her awareness of Warwick's disenchantment: "It was a #1; Dionne was dead choked and she's never forgiven me to this day."

Black recorded a new version of "Anyone Who Had a Heart" for her 1993 Through the Years album.

"Anyone Who Had a Heart" backed with "They Say It's Wonderful" was the third and final Fontana release by Mary May in January 1964 following and "Listen, All You Lovers" in April 1962 "Our Day Will Come" in February 1963. Nothing else is known of her.[1]

International hit

In Australia, both Dionne Warwick's and Cilla Black's versions of "Anyone Who Had a Heart" were released as singles: Warwick's version rose as high as #11 while Black's peak was #34. Warwick had the hit with "Anyone Who Had a Heart" in Belgium (Flemish Region), the Netherlands and South Africa, reaching #4 in each territory.

Petula Clark was on the roster of Pye Records, Warwick's UK label, and therefore in a position to almost immediately cover "Anyone Who Had a Heart" in several foreign language versions for the international market. Clark reached #7 in France with "Ceux Qui Ont Un Coeur" in the spring of 1964 then #5 in Italy with "Quelli che hanno un cuore" that September; in October 1964 Clark reached #1 in Spain - for a two-week period - with "Tú no tienes corazón".

The success of Petula Clark's translated version of "Anyone Who Had a Heart" did not preclude the Dionne Warwick original reaching #7 in Spain; Warwick's version also charted in France at #57 and in Italy at #30. In Germany, Clark's specialized cover, "Alles ist nun vorbei", was assigned a tandem chart ranking with both the Dionne Warwick and the Cilla Black versions of "Anyone Who Had a Heart" by with a peak achieved of #37 in May 1964, marking Warwick's sole German chart entry until 1982's "Heartbreaker" and Black's sole German charting ever.

The orchestra on Petula Clark's versions of "Anyone Who Had a Heart" was conducted by Tony Hatch. The instrumentation of Clark differs from that of the versions by Dionne Warwick and Cilla Black in utilizing an organ for the solo on the instrumental break rather than a saxophone as on the Warwick original or a bassoon as on Black's cover.

Petula Clark has never recorded "Anyone Who Had a Heart" in English, feeling that both Dionne Warwick and Cilla Black have definitively rendered the song in its original language. [citation needed]

Italian singer Mina performed a version of "Quelli che hanno un cuore" to an unprecedented Italian viewing audience of twenty million watching an episode of the *Canzonissima* series, orchestrated by Bruno Canfora for an ensemble of 400 musicians on 14 December 1968. [2][3]

Other versions

Dusty Springfield, who was a devotee of Warwick's records, cut a version of "Anyone Who Had a Heart" which may predate Cilla Black's: Springfield cut her version at Olympic Studios on 21 January 1964. The Breakaways – who sang on Cilla Black's "Anyone Who Had a Heart" - also sing on Springfield's recording.^[4]

Shirley Bassey, the vocalist for whom "Anyone Who Had a Heart" was brought to the UK, recorded it only in 1978 for her *The Magic is You* album with veteran producer Nick DeCaro. He had previously produced a version by Vikki Carr included on the 1968 album *The Way of Today!*.

The 1982 B.E.F. album *Music of Quality and Distinction, Vol. 1* featured a rendering of "Anyone Who Had a Heart" by Sandie Shaw marking a return to recording by the 1960s hitmaker although that particular track would not be her comeback vehicle as despite its single release (credited to B.E.F. Presents Sandie Shaw) the track fell short of the UK Top 50; it was a lower chart item (#71) in Australia.

Atomic Kitten reunited to remake "Anyone Who Had a Heart" for the 2008 album *Liverpool - The Number Ones Album*, to which the group member Natasha Hamilton (with Kush) contributed a remake of Cilla Black's subsequent single and #1 "You're My World". Issued as a digital single release, "Anyone Who Had a Heart" spent one week on the UK charts at #77, the only UK charting of "Anyone Who Had a Heart" since the Cilla Black version. It sold 5,154 copies in the United Kingdom.

Shelby Lynne remade "Anyone Who Had a Heart" for her 2008 tribute to Dusty Springfield: *Just a Little Lovin'*.

In 1993, Linda Ronstadt recorded the song for her album Winter Light.

In the US, the Dionne Warwick original remains the only version of "Anyone Who Had a Heart" to chart. In 1968, the Lettermen had a single release of the song as the B-side of their "bubbling under" hit "All the Grey Haired Men" (#109); it is the second track on the first side of their album "Goin' Out of My Head" (Capitol ST2865). Peter Rivera of Rare Earth sang lead on a 1975 remake of "Anyone Who Had a Heart" fronting HUB. In 2008, the Shelby Lynne recording from *Just a Little Lovin*' was issued as a digital single release.

Wynonna Judd performed "Anyone Who Had a Heart" on the TNT special *One Amazing Night* broadcast in 1998; her version is included on the soundtrack album. Judd also performed the song with Dionne Warwick on the latter's 2006 duet-based album *My Friends and Me*.

"Anyone Who Had a Heart" has also been recorded by Cheryl Baker, Michael Ball, Bec & Beth, Björk with the Brodsky Quartet, Tim Curry, Barbara Dickson, The Four Seasons, Jan Graveson, Vicky Leandros, Maureen McGovern, Anita Meyer, Olivia Newton-John, Maxine Nightingale, Páll Óskar, Inger Lise Rypdal, Martha Reeves and the Vandellas, Bic Runga, Luther Vandross, Silvie Paladino, and Kim Wilde.

Josie James released a jazz version of the song for her album *That Jazz* in 2012. She also performs the song during her concerts with Burt Bacharach.

American Idol contestant Angela Miller performed the song during the show's 12th season on their "Burt Bacharach & Hal David" episode.

"Love Won't Let Me Wait" is a 1975 single by Major Harris, a former member of R&B/soul group The Delfonics. "I (Who Have Nothing)" (sometimes billed as "I Who Have Nothing") is a song originally released in English by Ben E. King in 1963.

"I (Who Have Nothing)" is based on the Italian song "Uno Dei Tanti" (English: "One of Many"), with music by Carlo Donida and lyrics by Giulio "Mogol" Rapetti. "Uno Dei Tanti" was released by Joe Sentieri in 1961. The English lyrics for "I (Who Have Nothing)" were written by Jerry Leiber and Mike Stoller, who also produced the Ben E. King record using the backing track from Joe Sentieri's record (orchestra conducted by Luis Enriquez Bacalov).

The song was included in the musical revue Smokey Joe's Cafe.

Versions

The original English Ben E. King version was released in 1963 and reached #29 on the *Billboard* charts. Other versions which reached the Billboard charts were performed by Terry Knight and the Pack in 1966 (#46), by Liquid Smoke in 1970 (#82), by Warhorse in 1972 and by Sylvester in 1979 (#40). The most popular version in the US was by Tom Jones, peaking at #14 in 1970.

Shirley Bassey released the song (produced by George Martin) in September 1963, reaching #6 on the UK charts. She performs the song at almost every live concert she gives, and it is on many of her compilation albums, including *I Am What I Am* with the London Symphony Orchestra, and her 1989 album *La Mujer* where she sings it in Spanish ("Hoy No Tengo Nada"). She has also been instrumental in making Donida's music known to English-speaking audiences through arranging for translations from the Italian, having performed with the composer conducting his own music on Italian television.^[1]

Other versions of "I (Who Have Nothing)" have been recorded by Petula Clark, Al Kooper, The Spectres, who later became Status Quo, Roberta Flack & Donny Hathaway, Jedi Mind Tricks, Hodges, James & Smith, Luther Vandross & Martha Wash, Liza Minnelli, Brook Benton, Neil Diamond, Joe Cocker, Normie Rowe, Katherine Jenkins, Ijahman Levi, Linda Jones, Little Milton, Bob Guillaume, Midnight Blue, Manfred Mann's Earth Band, Dee Dee Warwick, Sam Sorono [2] (1950-2008), Ukulele Orchestra of Great Britain, and Vassilikos from Raining Pleasure; in January 2012, Gladys Knight released a dance remixes EP of her cover of the song.

A Greek version was recorded by Marinella, titled "Agapi (Love)" on her album *I Marinella Tragouda Megales Kyries* in 1992.^[3]

Recent interpretations include those by *American Idol* winner Jordin Sparks, Nikki Kerkhof, the winner of *Idols 4*, the Dutch version of *Pop Idol*, and Irish auditionee on *The X Factor* UK Mary Byrne.

Jordin Sparks sang the song during *British Invasion Week* on the sixth season of *American Idol*. A studio recording of her performance reached #74 on the Billboard Hot 100 following her win.

Haley Reinhart also sang it on season ten of *American Idol* in the Top 4 round, receiving a standing ovation from the judges and instant critical acclaim from critics and audiences alike.

"I (Who Have Nothing)"

Kerry Ellis performed the song with Brian May at the 2012 Samremo Music Festival. The pair have since recorded it.

French rocker Johnny Hallyday also sings the song in a duo with Amy Keys in his 2012 music tour.

Candice Glover performed this song for season twelve of *American Idol* in the Top 10 round, receiving a standing ovation from the judges. She also performed it again for the *American Idol* Top 2 round, only to receive yet another standing ovation.

"Goin' Out of My Head" is a song written by Teddy Randazzo and Bobby Weinstein, initially recorded by Little Anthony & the Imperials in 1964. Randazzo, a childhood friend of the group, wrote the song especially for them, having also supplied the group with their previous Top 20 Hit "I'm on the Outside (Looking In)". Their original version of the song was a *Billboard* Top 10 Pop hit, reaching #6 on the Billboard Hot 100, and #1 in the Canadian RPM-list in 1965. The song peaked at #8 on Cashbox magazine's R&B chart (Billboard was in a chart recess for R&B listings at that time). The Little Anthony & the Imperials original recording is the most commonly known version of the song, and the definitive version, although it's since been covered by many other artists.

"When I Need You" is a popular song written by Albert Hammond and Carole Bayer Sager. Its first appearance was as the title track of Hammond's 1976 album *When I Need You*. Leo Sayer's version, produced by Richard Perry, was a massive hit worldwide, reaching number 1 on the UK Singles Chart for three weeks in February 1977 after three of his earlier singles had stalled at number 2. It also reached number 1 on both the Billboard Hot 100 for a single week in May 1977;^[1] and the Hot Adult Contemporary Tracks.^[2] Sayer performed it on the second show of the third season of *The Muppet Show*.

"When I Need You"

Melody comparison

The melody of the "hook" line, or chorus of "When I Need You" is identical to the part of the Leonard Cohen song "Famous Blue Raincoat", where the lyrics are as follows: "Jane came by with a lock of your hair, she said that you gave it to her that night, that you planned to go clear." The melody of these lyrics matches the lyrics of "When I Need You" as follows: "(When I) need you, I just close my eyes and I'm with you, and all that I so want to give you, is only a heart beat away."

In a 2006 interview with the Globe & Mail Cohen said:

I once had that nicking happen with Leo Sayer. Do you remember that song 'When I Need You'?" Cohen sings the chorus of Sayer's number one hit from 1977, then segues into 'And Jane came by with a lock of your hair', a lyric from 'Famous Blue Raincoat'. 'Somebody sued them on my behalf ... and they did settle', even though, he laughs, 'they hired a musicologist, who said, that particular motif was in the public domain and, in fact, could be traced back as far as Schubert.

The same melody can be heard in Elton John's "Little Jeannie" in the lyrics: "Stepped into my life from a bad dream / Making the life that I had seem / Suddenly shiny and new"

Cover versions

The song was covered by, amongst others, the reggae singer Owen Gray, Céline Dion, Luther Vandross, Perry Como, Rod Stewart (on his compilation album *If We Fall in Love Tonight*), Barry Manilow (on his compilation album *Summer of '78*), Alpha Blondy, Edyta Górniak, polish version of album RMF moja i twoja muzyka Brotherhood of Man, Will Mellor, Julio Iglesias, Cliff Richard, Roger Whittaker, Clay Aiken and Gene Pitney on his 2003 album, Blue Angel - The Bronze Sessions.

- Surinamese balladeer Max Nijman recorded the song as *Mi Wan Shi Yu (Wanna See You)* shortly after the original charted at his Dutch home-base. In the early 1990s he made a new version for a *best of* -CD.
- Lani Hall recorded a Spanish version of the song, "Si Me Amaras (If You Loved Me)", for her 1985 album, Es
 Fácil Amar.
- Rahul Dev Burman recorded a Hindi version of the song (Tum se mil ke) for a 1989 film Parinda. The Cantonese duet version, known as "For You, I'll Never Give Up," was covered by Gallen Lo and Flora Chan, as the theme song of Hong Kong drama *Feminine Masculinity* in 1999.
- Ryuichi Kawamura recorded a cover in Japanese for his 2011 album The Voice.
- Joe McElderry covered the song for his fourth studio album, Here's What I Believe.
- Czech singer Václav Neckář make cover version in 1978 "Chci tě líbat (I Want To Kiss You)".
- Mexican group "Yndio" made their own Spanish version during 70's, called "Me haces falta".

Céline Dion version

"When I Need You" is a promotional single from Céline Dion's *Let's Talk About Love* album, released on September 7, 1998 in Brazil only.

After Céline Dion finished her Falling into You Tour in June 1997, she began to record her next English album. Dion and her manager and husband René Angélil wanted to include few cover versions on it. David Foster came up with the idea of recording Leo Sayer's hit "When I Need You." The song, recorded at Paramount Studios and Chartmaker Studios, was produced by Foster and included on Dion's *Let's Talk About Love* album, released on November 15, 1997. Céline Dion performed this song during the *Let's Talk About Love avec Julie Snyder* Canadian TV show in late 1997.

After a string of successful singles like "My Heart Will Go On" and "Immortality," Sony Music Entertainment decided to release "When I Need You" as a promotional single in Brazil (September 1998). Two previous singles were very successful in Brazil. However, with no music video and no promotion "When I Need You" failed to repeat

the success of Dion's earlier songs.

Authors of "When I Need You" worked with Dion also on several other songs. Albert Hammond wrote "Just Walk Away", included on *The Colour of My Love* album (1993) and Carole Bayer Sager wrote "The Prayer", which became a part of *These Are Special Times* (1998).

Critical reception

EW editor David Browne wrote: "an obligatory remake (a precisely enunciated version of Leo Sayer's *When I Need You*)". The New York Observer editor Jonathan Bernstein: "A sliver of redemption is found in the passable version of Leo Sayer's "When I Need You"".

"Any Day Now" is a popular song written by Burt Bacharach and Bob Hilliard in 1962. It has been recorded by numerous artists over the years, including notable versions by Chuck Jackson in 1962, Alan Price in 1965, Elvis Presley in 1969, and Ronnie Milsap in 1982.

Chuck Jackson

Jackson, an R&B singer born in South Carolina in 1937, recorded the first version of the song to hit the *Billboard* Hot 100 chart; it reached number twenty-three in 1962 with the title "Any Day Now (My Wild Beautiful Bird)" and spent six weeks in the Top 40. Jackson's version appeared on his album, which was also titled *Any Day Now*. The song was Jackson's highest charting hit on the US pop chart, and also peaked at number two for three weeks on the Hot Black Sides chart.

Elvis Presley

Presley recorded a cover version of "Any Day Now" on 21 February 1969 at American Sound studios, Memphis, Tennessee. This version appeared on his acclaimed album of that year, *From Elvis in Memphis*. Although not released as a single in its own right, the song appeared as the B-side to Presley's #3 US pop hit, "In the Ghetto", which appeared on the same album.

"Any Day Now"

Milsap, a popular country / pop singer, recorded the most widely known version of the song. It was the lead single from his 1982 album, *Inside*, and it peaked at #14 on the *Billboard* Hot 100 chart, spending nine weeks in the Top 40. In addition, this version went to #1 on both the *Billboard* Hot Country Singles chart (for one week) as well as the Hot Adult Contemporary Singles chart (for five weeks). It also went to #1 on Canadian Country and Adult Contemporary (for three weeks) Charts.

Milsap's producer, Tom Collins, encouraged Milsap to make the song sound different from the original by Chuck Jackson. As a result, Milsap recorded it in a different key and sang it softly.

"Lovely Day" is a song by American soul and R&B singer Bill Withers. Published in 1977 (see 1977 in music), the song was written by Withers and Skip Scarborough and appears on Withers' 1978 album *Menagerie*.

Released as a single in late 1977, "Lovely Day" peaked at #6 on the *Billboard* R&B chart and at #30 on the *Billboard* Hot 100 chart in the US in early 1978.^[1] It also made the Top 10 in the United Kingdom, where the song reached #7 on the British single chart.^[2]

Withers' version of "Lovely Day" has been re-released as a single in the United Kingdom at least twice since the song's first chart run; in 1987 the original version charted again at #92, while a version done by Ben Liebrand, named the "Sunshine Mix", made the British Top 10 in 1988, rising to #4. [3] This remix resulted in renewed enthusiasm for the Withers original, which incurred a surge in airplay into the early 1990s and came to firmly overshadow the radio presence of Liebrand's version. Public interest was again piqued in 1995, when "Lovely Day" was used in adverts for Tetley tea.

Producer Clarence McDonald also arranged the original 1977 version of the song and played keyboards. Guitars were played by Ray Parker, Jr., Jerry Knight played bass, and Russell Kunkel played drums.^[4]

Towards the end of the song, Withers holds a note for 18 seconds. This is believed to be the second-longest note in UK chart history; Morten Harket of A-ha's 20-second note in "Summer Moved On" is the longest. [5] Withers' note is sustained in chest voice, whereas Harket utilizes the falsetto range. The former remains the longest in any Top 40 hit in the United States.

"Lovely Day"

Covers and samples

"Lovely Day" has been covered and sampled numerous times since Withers' original recording. These alternate versions of the song span many different musical genres, including R&B, pop, jazz, gospel, dance, and rap.

One of the more notable versions of this song was performed by The S.O.U.L. S.Y.S.T.E.M. featuring Michelle Visage and was included on the soundtrack to the 1992 film *The Bodyguard*. This mostly rap version was titled "It's Gonna Be a Lovely Day", and it reached #34 on the *Billboard* Hot 100 chart and #44 on the *Billboard* R&B chart, in addition to spending three weeks atop the US *Billboard* Hot Dance Club Play chart in December 1992 and January 1993. [6] This version also reached #16 on the UK Singles Chart. [7]

"One Shining Moment"

"One Shining Moment"

"One Shining Moment" is a song written by David Barrett about the NCAA Men's College Basketball Championship. *One Shining Moment* is traditionally played at the end of CBS Sports's coverage of the championship game of the tournament. The song is played as the winning team's players cut down the nets, to a montage of highlights from the tournament.

Notable artists

Barrett was the original artist (1987-1993, 2000-2002), but CBS has also broadcast remakes by Teddy Pendergrass (1994–1999) and Luther Vandross (2003–2009, 2011–). It is believed to be the last song Vandross recorded before his stroke and subsequent death. A version by Jennifer Hudson was used for the 2010 NCAA Men's Division I Basketball Tournament. The format of the Hudson video deviated from prior years by cutting away from the tournament highlight montage on several occasions to show footage of Hudson singing with a recording studio backdrop, drawing criticism from some fans and viewers. On March 29, 2011, CBS announced that they would be reinstating the Luther Vandross version for the 2011 Tournament, and have continued to use it ever since.

History

Barrett, a singer-songwriter from Michigan, was inspired to write the song in 1986 while watching Larry Bird play on TV at a bar called the Varsity Inn in East Lansing, Michigan, after having played a gig there. He wrote the song down on a napkin the next day, later stating that "the song came fully formed" and "all the lyrics just wrote themselves." He passed the song along to high school friend Armen Keteyian, an investigative journalist for CBS Sports and, at that time, *Sports Illustrated*, who in turn passed it to CBS Sports Creative Director Doug Towey. However, Towey originally planned to debut the song not after a basketball game, but after a football game, Super Bowl XXI. It was to have been the postgame montage from that contest, but CBS ran past the expected airtime and had a primetime show to debut in the next time slot, so the montage was canceled. CBS then asked Barrett for use of the song after the 1987 NCAA championship game, in which Indiana beat Syracuse. Towey decided to use "One Shining Moment" to close CBS's coverage of the Tournament. The positive public response led to it becoming an annual feature. It has been used to end CBS's coverage ever since.

Doug Towey died on March 11, 2009 and was remembered with a tribute on CBS.

TBS will begin showing the final-four championship game every other year starting in 2016. The change has resulted in speculation about the use of montage by other networks.

Lyrics

The first verse is about inspiration and hard work. The second verse deals with adversity, accompanied by highlights of injured players and missed shots. The bridge includes lines such as "Feel the beat of your heart", often shown with players thumping their chests, and "Feel the wind in your face", with video of drives towards the basket.

There is a claim that the first line in the song was changed from "The ball is kicked" to "The ball is tipped." However, Barrett said [citation needed] "My daughter informed me that they claim that the initial line was the ball is kicked. That's not the case. It never was. The original line was, the gun goes off...which I changed to suit the tournament. Ironically - I wrote the song about basketball (after watching Larry Bird) but for some reason (who knows what I was thinking?!?) I didn't write it into the original first line. And so having the first line fall into place as it did was poetic and true."

The Chicago White Sox used the version with "The Gun Goes Off" to close their telecast on the final game at Comiskey Park on September 30th, 1990. [citation needed]

Change was an Italian-American post-disco group formed in Bologna, Italy in 1979 by businessman and executive producer Jacques Fred Petrus (1949–1986) and Mauro Malavasi (1957). They were heavily influenced by legendary disco band Chic.

Career

Concept

Change was initially formed in 1979 as a studio-band with a revolving cast of musicians, led by businessman and executive producer Jacques Fred Petrus, with the majority of song-writing and production carried out by Mauro Malavasi and Davide Romani. The band's dual Italian and American identity was a result of a production system, in which the music, excepting the vocals, were written and recorded by Italian collaborators in studios such as Fontoprint Studios, Bologna, Italy. The backing tracks were then taken to the USA where vocals were added by American performers, before being mixed into finalised versions in major studios such as the Power Station in New York.

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Immediate success

The band's debut album, *The Glow of Love*, was released in 1980. It was composed by a small team of writers made up of Romani, Malavasi, Paolo Gianolio (lead guitarist), Tanyayette Willoughby, Paul Slade and Wayne Garfield. The first single was the million seller "A Lover's Holiday" featuring the ad lib stylings of Zachary Sanders, known then for his work on *Schoolhouse Rock*. The follow-up hits from the album, "Searching" and the title song feature lead vocals by Luther Vandross who had yet to come to prominence. The three songs combined spent 9 weeks at #1 on *Billboard*'s Club Play Singles chart, enough to make it the #1 Disco album of the year and a million seller in the U.S. The success of "Searching" and "The Glow of Love" exposed Luther's voice to mainstream and eventually led to a successful solo career starting in 1981.

The follow-up album, *Miracles* was released in 1981. It was created by the same collection of writers and producers as had worked on the debut album. Due to contractual differences, Vandross refused to sing lead vocals on any of the album's tracks and was only featured on backing vocals on selected songs. After *Miracles*, Vandross continued to provide backup vocals for the group until 1981, when he left Change to pursue his solo career. Petrus and Malavasi signed up James 'Crab' Robinson to replace Vandross, owing to his ability to perform in a similar vocal style. Robinson shared vocals with Diva Gray for the album.

Miracles was released to a similar level of success as the début, though it did not manage to produce a mainstream crossover hit such as "A Lover's Holiday". "Paradise", "Hold Tight," and "Heaven Of My Life", combined were another huge hit on the *Billboard* Club Play Singles chart, spending 6 weeks at the number one spot in 1981.

Change's 1982 album, *Sharing Your Love*, moved the band further away from disco and club music and into genres such as R&B and Funk. The lead single "The Very Best In You" was one of the foremost examples of the group's take on R&B. The album also marked a new process in the writing of the band's albums. The team behind the first albums contributing less, instead a wide range of songs by other writers were recorded. Overall, the album continued a slowly declining trend in the commercial fortunes for the project, though the album sold well and "The Very Best In You" was popular.

Mixed fortunes

During the recording and touring of their fourth album, *This Is Your Time* (1983) Change's relatively stable line-up of performers, writers and producers as well as their commercial success faltered. The album failed to chart a major hit, with the title track flopping in comparison to previous lead singles. After the album's release Rick Brennan stepped into the place of Robinson who left to pursue a solo career, while producers Davide Romani and Mauro Malavasi departed for other projects. At the same time of these important departures, Change was bolstered by the contributions of bassist and songwriter Timmy Allen and returning vocalist Deborah Cooper now promoted to lead, both of whom remained in the band until its demise. After Change, Cooper worked with the C+C Music Factory in the 1990s.^[1]

The failure of the 1983 album left future of Change in jeopardy. Petrus wisely hired recently sacked Time members Jimmy Jam and Terry Lewis to write and produce what would become *Change Of Heart* in 1984. The album did well internationally, returning the group to the charts in Europe and the USA. The title track became Change's first top ten R&B hit in three years. Unlike former Change albums which had a large number of song-writers, *Change of Heart* was written by just three writers, four tracks were by Jimmy Jam and Terry Lewis' partnership while the remaining four were the work of Timmy Allen.

This upturn in fortune was soon cancelled out. As with previous collaborators, Petrus fell out with Jimmy Jam and Terry Lewis over a financial dispute, reportedly, the duo was never paid in full. Their loss was huge to the group, as Allen's efforts had fallen short of Jam and Lewis', and were closer to filler. Nevertheless, Allen was given the opportunity by Petrus to write and produce the majority of what became Change's final album in 1985, *Turn on Your Radio*. This album bore little of the polished dance and R&B sound that the group had always emphasised, and was less successful even than *This Is Your Time*, though Europe remained receptive to the group. The band's final US hit

"Let's Go Together" was notable as it was co-written by Petrus with returning collaborators Davide Romani and Paul Slade.

Demise and future

Turn on Your Radio was the band's commercial low point, but had not been intended as the act's final release. The formal end came after the death of Petrus in 1986.

While the original Change disappeared after Petrus' death, Davide Romani, Mike Francis, a.k.a. Francesco Puccioni (1961–2009), and Patrick Boothe attempted to revive the project in 1990. This new Change project was planned for a release on BMG North America under the name 'X-Change' in 1992, but due to lack of money, the album was left unreleased.

The availability of the X-Change recordings was resolved in 2009 after Romani closed a deal with the Italian label Fonte Records to release the album late that same year. The album was released under the title *Change Your Mind*, it was produced by Davide Romani and Francesco Puccioni, written by Davide Romani, Mike Francis and Patrick Boothe, with Boothe as the main lead vocalist.

In 2001, American R&B/pop singer Janet Jackson featured a sample of Change's *The Glow Of Love* in her number 1 single "All for You".

Line up

Change was effectively a studio group composed of session musicians and a core group of collaborators led by Jacques Fred Petrus and Mauro Malavasi. After the release of *The Glow of Love* and *Miracles*, Petrus sought to give the group more of an image and put together a group for promotion and live performances. 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

Craig Seymour (born November 25, 1968) is an American writer, photographer, celebrity interviewer, music critic and former stripper. He was born in Washington, D.C.. He has written for *The Washington Post*, *Entertainment Weekly*, *Vibe*, and *Spin*, among other publications, and has served as pop music critic for *The Buffalo News* and the *The Atlanta Journal-Constitution*. He holds a Ph.D. in American Studies from the University of Maryland, College Park in College Park. Seymour was a professor of English at the University of Massachusetts Dartmouth, and is now Associate Professor of Journalism at Northern Illinois University. He lives in Chicago.

He has interviewed and profiled some of the biggest names in music, including Janet Jackson, Mariah Carey, and Luther Vandross, who granted him numerous interviews. Seymour has also been a music analyst for CNN's *Headline News*. He is a native of Washington, D.C.

Book — All I Could Bare

As a graduate student at the University of Maryland in the 1990s, Seymour started frequenting the strip clubs in Washington D.C. while writing his master's thesis: "Desire and Dollar Bills: An Ethnography of a Gay Male Striptease Club." He used these experiences to write the book All I Could Bare: My Life in the Strip Clubs of Gay Washington, D.C. Seymour stated that stripping gave him the confidence he needed to interview big stars like Mariah Carey. In an interview with Dallas Voice, Seymour credited his stripping career with "the ease I had asking celebrities extremely personal questions, especially those having to do with sex and relationships. After all, when

someone is playing with your dick in public, it's not only potentially awkward for you, the one being played with, it can also be weird for the person doing the playing, because he is exposing his desires so nakedly in front of other people."

Book — Luther: The Life and Longing of Luther Vandross

This book chronicles the life of singer and producer Luther Vandross, including his lifelong love of music and his infatuations with girl groups, particularly Patti LaBelle and the Bluebelles and Dionne Warwick. Seymour includes mini-profiles of the many musicians who helped Vandross along his way.

When Seymour pressed Vandross in a 2001 interview to open up about his sexuality, including rumours that he was gay, Vandross told him "You're trying to zero in on something that you are never ever gonna get. Look at you, just circling the airport. You ain't never gonna land."

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

Luther Burger

Luther Burger



A **Luther Burger**, or **doughnut burger** (among several naming variations), is a hamburger or cheeseburger with one or more glazed doughnuts in place of the bun. These sandwiches have a disputed origin, and tend to run between approximately 800 and 1,500 calories (3,300 and 6,300 kJ).

Origins

According to legend, the burger was named for and was a favorite (and possible invention) of singer-songwriter and record producer Luther Vandross. This origin is mentioned in a January 2006 episode of animated series *The Boondocks*, "The Itis", in which the character Robert Freeman creates a restaurant which serves the burger.

Mulligan's, a suburban bar in Decatur, Georgia, serves the Luther Burger in addition to its "hamdog". *The Daily Telegraph* reported that Mulligan's may be progenitor of the burger when the owner substituted the doughnuts when running out of buns.



The Gateway Grizzlies baseball team of Sauget, Illinois have served the Luther Burger at their ballpark. Their version consists of a deep-fried Krispy Kreme doughnut around a black Angus all-beef patty, melted cheese, and two strips of bacon. Dubbed a cardiologist's worst nightmare, this burger is 1,000 calories (4,200 kJ). Aside from bringing in revenue from sales, it has drawn more fans to come out to the ballpark: apparently, attendance at games has increased and the burger is one of the most popular aspects of the park. The burger has met with criticism from burger purists and from people who are turned off by the thought of the taste and the health implications.

In Astoria, Queens, a Lebanese burger restaurant began selling a halal-compliant version of the Luther Burger (a Crave Doughnut Burger) with turkey bacon in 2010. The restauranteur added the $\frac{1}{4}$ -pound (0.11 kg) burger to the menu after a friend experienced one while traveling through the Southern United States. Restaurant owner Firas Zabib has said he sells 10–20 of the US\$6.50 burgers per day, and that his was the first shop in New York City to sell them.

Around the United States, copies and variations of the Luther Burger have appeared at state fairs. The 2010 Wisconsin State Fair variation held a \(^1_4\)-pound Angus beef burger, topped with Wisconsin cheddar cheese and two strips of chocolate-covered bacon, on a toasted Krispy Kreme doughnut bun. The burger sold for US\$5 and equaled 1,000 Calories. Erika Celeste, for National Public Radio's *All Things Considered* detailed a "doughnut burger" sold at the 2010 Indiana State Fair when discussing the imaginative and caloric "arms race" at state fairgrounds to devise new "wackier" menu items: "[a] fresh patty of beef and melted cheese sandwiched between two glazed doughnuts". The Indiana vendor explained his impetus to sell the burger after seeing Paula Deen "[do] it on TV". The 800-calorie (3,300 kJ) burger



was described as having a salty-sweet taste, and surprisingly ungreasy. The "Krispy Kreme Doughnut Burger" as served at the 2010 Mississippi State Fair was garnished with "lettuce, tomato and a generous slice of raw onion", and was estimated to provide 1,500 calories (6,300 kJ). The Alabama, Arizona, Louisiana, North Carolina, South Carolina, and Tulsa State Fairs also served up Luther Burger variants in 2010.

Epic Burgers and Waffles (EBW) introduced their doughnut cheeseburger to the 2011 Canadian National Exhibition; they were inspired after seeing it at fairs in the Southern United States and noting its popularity at the Calgary Stampede the month before. EBW's version cost C\$8 (or C\$10 to add bacon and a fried egg), and contained 1,500 calories (6,300 kJ).
