## Fritz Pollard Jr.

**Frederick Douglas** "**Fritz**" **Pollard Jr.** (February 18, 1915 – February 15, 2003) was an American athlete who competed mainly in the 110 metre hurdles.

While a student at the <u>University of North Dakota</u>, he was a running back for the <u>football</u> team. He was "picked All North Central Conference in 1937 and 1938, and was a Collier's Magazine Little All-America selection in football in 1938." [1] He also competed as a



member of the university's varsity boxing team. Pollard competed for the United States in the  $\underline{1936 \text{ Summer}}$  Olympics in Berlin in the 110 meter hurdles where he won the bronze medal. [2]

Pollard graduated from UND with a bachelor's degree majoring in education. He went on to earn a law degree from the <u>John Marshall Law School (Chicago)</u>. He also served in the U.S. Army as a special services officer during World War II." Some years after he war, he became a Foreign Service officer and retired in 1981 as the director of the State Department's overseas schools for US citizens. [1]

Pollard was a member of Alpha Phi Alpha fraternity. [3]

Pollard's father was Fritz Pollard Sr., the first African American head coach in the National Football League. [3]

He is survived by one of his two children, Fritz D. Pollard III (Cheryl Pollard- deceased) and two grandchildren Meredith Kaye Russell and Marcus Stephan Pollard.
